Phi Theta Kappa students learning through service

College students have a strong tradition of academic performance and community service. Nowhere is this more evident than in the accomplishments of students in Phi Theta Kappa, Chipola's local chapter of the international honor society.

PTK members follow an annual Honors Study Topic assigned to all chapters in the international organization. This year's international topic is "Customs, Traditions, and Celebrations: The Human Drive for Community." CJC's chapter has already carried out several activities related to the topic, including a series of satellite seminars, which a number of students and local residents attended.

Students with at least a 3.5 GPA are eligible to join PTK, but membership also requires a commitment to service. Faculty sponsor Jody Spooner said, "Students are invited to join because of their excellent academic performance, but they also participate in service and leadership activities."

PTK hosts an Annual Leadership Conference for high school juniors and also organizes a month-long service project to help needy members of the community. Chipola students have raised money for children at Christmas, held food drives and collected school supplies for local elementary school students.

Spooner says he is particularly proud of the chapter's service and leadership activities. "Of course, I'm proud of our students' academic performance, but I'm even more pleased that they are learning how to contribute to their communities and use their knowledge to become strong leaders," said Spooner.

PTK students also have the opportunity to travel and learn at international conventions and institutes in metropolitan areas like Denver, Orlando, Atlanta and Chicago. PTK International hosts an Honors Institute to help students relate to important issues and features internationally-recognized speakers, small group seminars, educational field trips and student presentations. Spooner has twice been selected to serve as a Faculty Scholar during the Honors Institute.


In recent years, the Chipola chapter has received several state, national and international honors, including the prestigious Fellowship Hallmark Award for the

The league-leading Chipola Indians improved to 5-2 in the conference and 26-7 overall with an 8-5 win over Pensacola on March 27.

Ricardo Nanita hit a grand slam in the top of the seventh to break a 4-4 tie and give CJC the edge.

Chipola was scheduled to host Pensacola on Thursday, March 28 in a makeup of a game that was rained out on March 26.

CJC Nursing Program expanded

The Board of Nursing recently approved significant curriculum changes for the Chipola Junior College Nursing Programs.

Students will now be admitted to both the practical (LPN) and associate degree (RN) together for the first year. The program will admit two classes per year, one in the Fall and one in the Spring, thus offering all nursing courses twice per year for the first time. Enrollment capacity also has been expanded, allowing CJC to accept up to 80 students per year.

All students will be required to take pre-requisite courses prior to entry. Pre-requisites include Intermediate Algebra (MAT 1033) or College Algebra (MAC 1105), General Psychology (PSY 2012) and Communications Skills I (ENC 1101). To qualify for Anatomy and Physiology (BSC 2093) in the first semester in the program, students should take either Introduction to Biology (BSC 1005) or receive departmental approval to take Anatomy and Physiology (BSC 2093) without (BSC 1005). The new program also will allow students to take Anatomy and Physiology I and II, and Microbiology (MCB 2010) while in the program, rather than prior to acceptance.

Additionally, all nursing students will be eligible to take the NCLEX-PN licensure exam following completion of the third semester in the program. CJC students may then proceed in the program for two additional semesters and receive an associate of nursing degree and then be eligible to take the NCLEX-RN licensure exam.
