Chipola's Phi Theta Kappa wins 'National Championship'

The Chipola chapter of Phi Theta Kappa won the academic equivalent of a national championship when it was named Most Distinguished Chapter among all 1,200 chapters at the 85th International Phi Theta Kappa Convention in Anaheim, California.

Chipola's Nu Chi Chapter also earned top awards in the Phi Theta Kappa Hallmark categories of Fellowship, Scholarship, Leadership and Service. Hallmark awards are presented to only 10 schools

in each of the four categories. Chipola was one of only two colleges to earn awards in all four Hallmarks. The Chipola group also won an educational software package valued at \$35,000 from The Right Education Internet, an online benefits partner.

Chipola Pool to open April 21

The CJC Pool opens April 21 with a variety of aquatic activities on tap.

Pool hours are Monday through Friday, 11 a.m. to 5 p.m. Summer hours will begin May 14 extending the leisure hours to include Saturday 10 a.m. to 6 p.m. and Sunday 1 p.m. to 6 p.m. The pool is also available for party rentals and lap swimming.

Pool admission is \$2 for children under 13 and \$3 for all others. Season passes are available for leisure swimming from April through September. Individual passes are \$55. Family passes are \$85 for two or three persons, \$95 for four or five persons and \$10 for each additional person above five. Swim Team passes are \$90 for parents and one child, \$120 for parents and two children and \$10 for each additional child above two.

An American Red Cross Lifeguard Course will be scheduled later this month.
