Chipola hosts Tallahassee on Tuesday

Chipola hosts Tallahassee Community College in a pair of important home conference games, Tuesday, Jan. 25, in the Milton H. Johnson Health Center.

The women's game tips off at 5:30 p.m. The men play at 7:30 p.m. In addition to some great basketball, Chipola fans will have the chance to win a new Pontiac G-6 valued at \$24,000 during halftime of the men's game. Hopkins Pontiac in Marianna is sponsoring the contest.

Both Chipola squads travel to Okaloosa Walton for games on Saturday, Jan. 22.

The Indians are riding an impressive 17-game win streak that has pushed the squad to a number-two ranking in the Florida JUCO Poll and fifth in the national poll.

Chipola is 19-1 overall and 2-0 in league play following a 100-91 victory over Pensacola on Jan. 18. FCCAA Player of the Week Mario Boggan led Chipola with 37 points and 13 rebounds. Boggan is fourth on the state scoring list averaging 20.2 per game. Kendarius Pelton scored 14 points. Ryne Hamlett had 11 points and 6 rebounds. Anderson Ferreira scored 12. Stephon Hannah had 9 points, 7 assists and 3 steals.

The Indians led 53-37 at the half, but Pensacola pulled to within six late in the game. Chipola shot 55 percent from the field; 47 percent from the three point line and 66 percent from the free throw line. PJC was 13 of 25 from three point line and out-rebounded Chipola 29-28. The Indians gave

up 21 offensive boards.

The Indians scored an 84-82 win over Gulf Coast on Jan. 15. Boggan led Chipola with 32 points. Ferreira had 22 points. Pelton had 11 points. Hannah scored 7, with 6 rebounds and 9 assists. Brent Crews had 9 rebounds and 7 points. The Indians led by 5 at half and by as many as 14 in the second half.

The Lady Indians are 1-2 in league play and 14-4 overall following a 59-47 loss to Pensacola on Jan. 18. Elaine McCants and Ashley Perry led Chipola with 9 points apiece. Chinata Nesbit scored 8. Nesbit was an Honorable Mention pick for FCCAA player of the week. She is fifth on the state rebounding list averaging 10.7 per game and 22nd in scoring averaging 12.1 points per game.

Chipola was narrowly defeated by top-ranked Gulf Coast, 69-61 on Jan. 15. McCants led Chipola with 17. Tamika Jackson had 11. Chipola head coach David Lane said, "We had an opportunity to win the game. If we play the way we did during stretches of the Gulf Coast game, we'll do very well. Mentally, we just need to be able to handle our successes." Chipola pulled to within six points with four minutes remaining.

The Lady Indians opened the league race with an 86-64 win over North Florida on Jan. 12. Chinata Nesbit led Chipola with 25 points. Nacole Stocks scored 16.
