The late “Mr. Roy” Beall recognized for philanthropy

The late Roy B. Beall, a founding father of Chipola Junior College, has been recognized for his outstanding philanthropy by The Council for Resource Development, a national organization.

CRD presented Regional and State Benefactor Awards to Mr. Roy in recognition of his contributions and commitment to Chipola and the establishment of the Roy B. Beall Scholarship Endowment offered through the Chipola Junior College Foundation.

The purpose of the CRD Benefactor Award is to recognize outstanding contributions to community colleges. The award embodies the ideals of philanthropy, leadership and volunteerism in the service of community, technical and junior colleges.

The family of Roy B. Beall attended the recent Benefactor Banquet in Washington, DC. In attendance were: Jean Beall Neel, daughter; grandchildren Dana Neel Cobb, Kitty Neel Myers, Sharon Beall Mason, and Roy Burns Beall, III; great-grandchildren Jenny Cobb Steever, Kitty Cobb and Roseann Mason.

At the ceremony a representative of the family said: “Our grandfather’s life passion and commitment was educational excellence and access for everyone. It is especially gratifying, many years after he passed away, that he is being honored for that passion and commitment today.”

Chipola president Dr. Gene Prough, said, “During his lifetime, Beall exemplified all of the traits of an outstanding benefactor. He gave not only his financial support to Chipola, but he also was a

steadfast leader and long-time volunteer.”

Beall’s relationship with Chipola began in 1946 when a group of business leaders met to discuss the possibility of opening a private college for students in the area. In the summer of 1947, Chipola opened its doors on the campus of the old Marianna Army Base. Beall was one of the founders and also served as Chairman of the Board for many years. During his 23 years of continuous service to Chipola, he never missed a single meeting of any board or agency on which he served. His early leadership at Chipola was instrumental in developing the college into the successful institution it is today from its humble beginnings as a small private college with barely enough funds to exist.

In 1983, Beall approached Chipola officials about sponsoring a scholarship drive that would support the top two academic students and top academic athlete from each of Jackson County’s six high schools. His idea was to award each with a one-year scholarship to begin their pursuit of higher education. He raised the money single-handedly and expanded the program the next year to include all five of the counties within the college’s district. This initial fundraising effort has grown into a scholarship endowment bearing his name with an account balance of over \$122,000.

Chipola hosts Okaloosa-Walton on Tuesday

Both Chipola basketball squads host Okaloosa-Walton on Tuesday, Jan. 28, in the Milton H. Johnson Health Center. The Lady Indians play at 5:30 p.m. The Indians play at 7:30 p.m.

Both Chipola teams are on the road at Tallahassee on Saturday, Jan. 25.

The Indians improved to 16-6 and 3-1 in the conference with an 86-81 win at Gulf Coast on Wednesday, Jan. 22. The Indians never let go of the lead, with four players scoring in double figures. Nick Williams led the CJC with 22 points, his best performance yet. Michael Wilds scored 19. Brandon Freeman had 15 and Tom Frericks added 12. Walker Russell also made a big contribution with 17 assists. Head coach Cross said, "I thought this was a good road win. Anytime you win on the road in this league it is a good win."

Chipola's win over Gulf Coast creates a three-way tie for first place in the conference with Chipola, Okaloosa-Walton and Tallahassee all at 3-1, as of Jan. 23.

Cross said, "This Saturday's game with TCC is a key game for us." A win over the Eagles would keep Chipola and Okaloosa-Walton tied for first in the league and bump Tallahassee to second.

The Lady Indians fell top ranked Gulf Coast, 91-49, on Jan. 22. Chipola's defense held Gulf Coast's All American candidate guard, Denise Thompson, to 6 points. Rebecca Montz was Chipola's top scorer with 14 points.

CJC is third in the league at 3-2 and 13-7 overall. Gulf Coast is first at 5-0. Okaloosa-Walton is second at 4-1. Due to a special bye this year, the top three women's teams in the Panhandle Conference will ad-

vance to the FCCAA State Basketball Tournament to be held at Chipola, March 5-8.

The Lady Indians also face Tallahassee this weekend. A win against the Lady Eagles would put Chipola in a tie for the second place.

The Indians scored a 77-60 win over Pensacola on Jan. 18. JueMichael Young led CJC with 17 points and 8 rebounds. Michael Wilds and Brandon Freeman each had 14. Walter Harris added 10.

The Lady Indians also scored a 71-63 win over Pensacola. Rebecca Montz led Chipola with 15 points. Heidi Fowler followed with 14. Lanita Carter and Andrea Martin scored 12 apiece.

The ASE exam is the nationally recognized industry standard for automotive


technicians. Most repair facilities prefer ASE Certified Technicians and pay more for their services.

According to John Gardner, CJC Automotive Technology instructor, "The ASE test is a benchmark for automotive technicians and is an outstanding achievement for our students. Most technicians do not attempt the ASE test before working in the automotive field and completing extensive education."

Chipola's Auto Tech program became


an ASE Certified Program in 2002. This designation assures employers that rigorous standards and guidelines set by the industry are being taught within a program.


Gardner says, "I am very proud of the hard work that our students perform daily which affords them the opportunity of passing the ASE exam. With excellent students and the support of our college administration, the Chipola Automotive Technology program is second to none."
