

Cavin wins Kirkland Award

Math instructor Rose Cavin was chosen by her peers to receive the Kirkland Award for Excellence in Teaching at the 2004 Chipola College graduation.

Cavin teaches intermediate algebra, college algebra, math for liberal arts, pre-calculus trigonometry. She will teach the "Learning Math with Technology" course in Chipola's new bachelor's degree program this Summer.

She is former chair of the Council for Chipola Educators and has served as sponsor of the Chipola Brain Bowl team. She has represented the faculty on the Governance Council and currently serves on the following college committees: Curriculum and Courses of Study, Institutional Planning and Accountability and Faculty Awards. She is an active member and former president of Altrusa, a community based women's service club.

She earned a Bachelor's degree in math education from Florida State University, a Master's degree from the University of West

Florida, and has done postgraduate work at Troy State University. She also has taught math at Marianna High School and Marianna Middle School.

Cavin and her husband Dale have two children, Rob and Julie. Rob is a Processor Engineer with Intel, Inc., in California. Julie is a second year veterinary medicine student at North Carolina State University who plans to become a marine mammal veterinarian.

The Kirkland Award was endowed 15 years ago by brothers J. R. and David Kirkland in honor of their parents Carolyn and the late Willis Kirkland of Marianna. The award provides \$1,000 to the recipient. College officials met recently with representatives from Communications International, Inc., to discuss the program.

Chipola employees James Bailey, Electronic Engineering Technology Instructor, John Watson, Computer Electronics Instructor, Louise Neel, Continuing Education Department and Bud Riviere, Dean of Workforce Development hosted the meeting. CI personnel Dale DeDominico from Vero Beach and Landis Adams of Marianna participated in the meeting with legal counsel, Robert Trammel.

The proposed program will be based on a need for trained technicians with expertise in the radio communications electronics. Curriculum development is underway for the first class which could begin in August.

Chipola Workforce Dean Bud Riviere, said, "Chipola College and our Workforce Development Division are very pleased to serve the needs of this local industry through specialized training in communications electronics".
