

Register through Oct. 24 for Chipola Mini-Term

Registration continues for Chipola College's first-ever Mini-Term through Oct. 24 with the exception of Oct. 16-17 when the college will be closed for Fall Break. The mini-term, featuring eight-weeks of classes instead of the typical 16-week semester, includes some 18 classes which meet once a week. Classes begin Oct. 18.

The October short term is designed to assist those who are working toward completing the classes in the Associate in Arts, Associate in Science and Associate in Applied Science degree programs.

The State Employee Fee Waiver program may be used to cover tuition for the Mini-Term. In state tuition is available for Alabama and Georgia residents.

Indians ranked first in the nation

The Chipola College men's basketball team is ranked first in the nation in *Street and Smith's College Basketball Yearbook*, the premier pre-season publication for college basketball.

The magazine also listed two Chipola players among the best in the nation. Returning point guard Jamarcus Ellis was named to *Street and Smith's* First Team of Super Sophomores. At 6-6, Ellis averaged 13.5 points, 9.9 rebounds and 3.2 blocks in his freshman year. DeAndre Thomas, a 6-8, 290 pounder, also was named among the nation's top 25 sophomores. Ellis was named first team All-Conference in 2005-06. Thomas earned Second Team All-Conference honors.

Third year Chipola head coach Greg Heiar says, "We are honored to be ranked at the top of the pre-season poll. We're going to work every day to prove that we are worthy of this recognition." Heiar shared Conference Coach of the Year honors with TCC's Eddie Barnes last season. Both teams finished with identical 10-2 league records.

The Indians finished the 2005-06 campaign with a 29-4 mark, falling just short in their bid to become the first men's team ever to win three straight Florida state titles when they lost to Tallahassee, 98-96, in triple overtime in the 2006 State Championship.

Street and Smith touts the Panhandle Conference as one of the toughest in the country with conference coaches projecting some four dozen players from the league as serious D-1 prospects. Two

of Chipola's conference rivals also are ranked in the Top 25. Okaloosa-Walton is number 12 and Tallahassee is number 15.

The Indians open their season on the road Oct. 13 and 14 in the Mitchell-Mullen Dallas (TX) Blowout. Chipola hosts Brevard and Pearl River in the Milton H. Johnson Classic, Nov. 3-4.

Chipola seeks funds for First Generation scholars

The Chipola College Foundation is seeking donations for a new scholarship fund to help "first generation in college" students.

During the 2006 Legislative Session, \$5 million in non-recurring general revenue funds was appropriated to the community college system to fund "First Generation in College" Scholarships.

Each of Florida's 28 community colleges was allocated a portion of the \$5 million based upon a formula of educational factors. Chipola's portion is \$34,000.

In order for Chipola to receive these funds, private donations for a dollar for dollar match must be received at the Chipola College Foundation by **Dec. 1, 2006**.

"First Generation in College" Scholarships are to be awarded to students toward tuition and/or books. Private donations and the state match portion must be spent and cannot be endowed. A first generation in college student is defined as an individual both of whose parents did not complete a bachelor's degree.

Applications for the First Generation Scholarships would be available in late February 2007 and due June 18, 2007.

Riviere says, "This apprenticeship training program will afford the student apprentice an outstanding opportunity to obtain gainful employment in an area of great unmet need in this region. Chipola is pleased to collaborate in this effort."

Al Herndon, Regional Apprenticeship Representative with FMAEF, says "We are pleased that Chipola has offered assistance in our region to help meet the demand for masonry apprentices. The masonry field is both challenging and rewarding in this part of Florida. There are excellent career opportunities awaiting our apprentices."

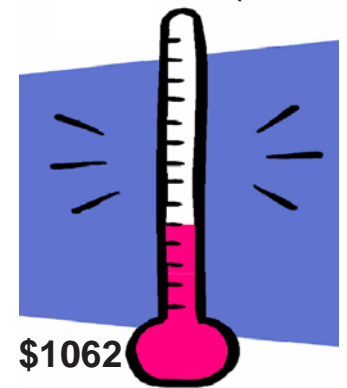
