Opening night gala to benefit Anna K. Williams Scholarship

Chipola College will host an Opening Night Gala, Thursday, Oct. 23, at 6 p.m., prior to the first performance of “The Last Night of Ballyhoo.”

The \$25 a plate dinner will benefit the Anna K. Williams memorial scholarship fund. Anna participated in two Chipola theater productions while in high school - “Camelot” and “The Importance of Being Earnest.” Her mother Margie Williams, said, “Anna loved the theater and met many new friends in the process. Anna’s Scholarship was established by her dearest friends who knew how much she loved the theater and dance.” The first scholarship in Anna’s name was presented this year.

Anna was a dance major at the Florida School of the Arts in Palatka at the time of her death in 1997. She died in a car accident on the last day of her freshman year—the same day she nailed her first triple turn on toe.

Anna’s big plans were to complete her dance training, attend Sante Fe Community College’s Zoo Keeper program and return home to open her own dance studio. She also wanted to work with her favorite Veterinarian Dr. Randy Peel and Animal Control Officer

Robert Williams to help take care of and place unwanted animals in good homes.

Anna immersed herself in dance under the tutelage of instructor Rebecca Parmer. “Rebecca played a great role in Anna’s life. She even accompanied her in auditions at the School for the Arts,” her mother said. Anna was a student of dance for 17 years under the instruction of Kim Culliver, Stacey Larkin, Barbara Allen, Frances Logue and Rebecca Parmer (Miss Becky).

Anna was a member of the MHS Dance Line, Jr. Optimist Club, and played cymbals in the band. She also worked at Ark Animal Hospital through the DCT program during which time she adopted five kittens.

Her mother says, “I hope to continue this tradition for every opening night from now on for the fall and spring performances to raise money for Anna’s scholarship endowment. We want theatergoers to get accustomed to a big opening night event.” JL Creative Catering will prepare the dinner which will feature a German theme. A portion of the proceeds from the gala also will go to the theater program.

Lady Indians basketball coach resigns

Chipola Lady Indians basketball coach Jason Keene submitted his resignation on Tuesday, Sept. 30, citing professional and personal reasons.

Chipola president Dr. Gene Prough said, “Our first concern is that we take care of our student athletes and the college they represent.” The head coaching position will be open until filled. In the meantime, Prough said he would consider hiring an interim coach.

The Lady Indians made it to the semi-final round of the 2003 FCCAA State Basketball Tournament before losing to Okaloosa-Walton. Chipola defeated Miami-Dade in the first round of the tourney. Lady Indians Rebecca Montz and Lanita Carter were named to the Women’s All Tournament team.

Chipola finished the 2003 season with an 18-14 record. Keene was 46-46 in three seasons at Chipola.
