The presentations are part of an ongoing program slated in conjunction with the "Apalachicola River: An American Treasure," exhibit on display through Oct. 12.

Guests will have the opportunity to view the exhibit of large black and white photographs by Clyde Butcher and Richard Bickel,

and the documentary film by Elam Stoltzfus.

On Wednesday, Oct. 11, at 10 a.m., Dr. Steven J. Herrington, Apalachicola River and Bay Project Coordinator with the Nature Conservancy, will discuss Aquatic Conservation and Restoration at the Apalachicola Bluffs and Ravines Preserve.

Herrington is an ichthyologist with over

ten years experience examining the biology of fish and their interactions with the environment. He majored in Ecology, Ethology, and Evolution at the University of Illinois at Urbana/Champaign. He was awarded a Master's in Natural Resources and Environmental Sciences, focusing on the effects of environmental degradation on stream fish. He earned a doctorate in Fisheries at Auburn while studying the ecology and impacts of introduced fish species in the southeast. He is currently working with federal, state, and local partners to assess migratory fish passage potential at Jim Woodruff Dam on the Apalachicola River.

Chipola to offer Mini-Term

Registration for Chipola College's first-ever Mini-Term begins Monday, Oct. 9.

Chipola seeks funds for First Generation Scholarship

The Chipola College Foundation is seeking donations for a new scholarship fund to help “first generation in college” students.

During the 2006 Legislative Session, \$5 million in non-recurring general revenue funds was appropriated to the community college system to fund “First Generation in College” Scholarships.

Each of Florida’s 28 community colleges was allocated a portion of the \$5 million based upon a formula of educational factors. Chipola’s allocated portion is \$34,000.

In order for Chipola to receive these funds, private donations for a dollar for dollar match must be received at the Chipola College Foundation by Dec. 1, 2006.

“First Generation in College” Scholarships are to be awarded to students toward tuition and/or books. Private donations and the state match portion must be spent and cannot be endowed. A first generation in college student is defined as an individual both of whose parents did not complete a bachelor’s degree.

According to Foundation director Julie Fuqua, “First Generation in College Scholarships at Chipola would be offered in the Fall 2007 based upon the dollar amount we raise to receive the state match.”

Applications for the First Generation Scholarships would be available in late February 2007 and due June 18, 2007.

Donations may be sent to the Chipola College Foundation, 3094 Indian Circle, Marianna, FL 32446, and must be earmarked for the First Generation in College Scholarship match.

Apalachicola, will present a workshop concert of original music featuring his hand-made instruments.

Tedder's musical talents stretch over 30 years of performing, composing and recording sounds near his remote cabin on the Sopchoppy River. Intrigued by the natural sounds of first primitive instruments, Tedder learned to make drums from hollow logs and flutes from the native river cane. His demonstration of hand-made instruments will feature udu, an African clay pot drum; turtle shell rattle; didgeridoos and river cane flutes and saxophones.

He also will describe the process of building songs with recorded samples of individual musical tracks (including nature sounds) and how they are layered, eventually building up to the final mix of a song.

The documentary film will be shown at 2 p.m., Thursday, Oct. 12, and again following Tedder's presentation.

The Apalachicola exhibit is made possible locally by the Chipola Area Board of REALTORS®, the Marianna Automobile Dealers Association, the Jackson County Tourist Development Council and Friends of the Florida Caverns.
