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Boston Pops conductor performs Monday at Chipola

Boston Pops conductor Keith Lockhart, will present, "*Why I Sing in the Shower*" at the Chipola Junior College Theater, Monday, **Oct. 9**, at 7 p.m.

The event is nearly sold out. A few tickets are still available in the CJC Business Office. A handful of tickets may be available at the door beginning at 6:30 p.m. on Monday.

Only the third conductor of the Boston Pops Orchestra, Lockhart follows in the footsteps of such luminaries as Arthur Feidler and John Williams. In his lively presentation, Lockhart discusses this legacy as well as his dedication to making the art of classical music accessible to everyone, especially children.

Lockhart began his musical studies with piano lessons at the age of seven. He holds degrees from Furman University, and Canegie-Mellon University. He studied piano with John Noel Roberts, Gwendolyn Stevens, and Maria-Rgina Sidhofer of the Vienna Hochschule. His training as a conductor includes study with Istvan Jaray, Otto-Werner Mueller, Harold Farberman and Werner Torkanowsky. He holds hon-

orary doctorates from The Boston Conservatory and Northeastern University.

Lockhart is famous for rousing appearances on PBS's "Evening at the Pops" and A & E's annual "Holiday at Pops" and "Pop Goes the Fourth" concerts. The conductor devotes much of his spare time sharing

his love for music with his younger fans. As conductor of the Boston Symphony Orchestra Youth Concerts, he leads 15 educational concerts a year for school children and their families.

Lockhart is the first event in the 2000-01 Chipola Artist Series. Three other performances are scheduled. **The Chvatal/Kritzer Duo** will perform **Nov. 14**. **Chicago City Limits**, comedy and improvisation, hits the CJC stage **Jan. 8**. **The Florida Vocal Arts Ensemble**, will perform **Jan. 30**.

Individual event tickets—\$12 for adults, \$8 for 18 and under, and \$4 for CJC students—will be available two weeks prior to performances at the CJC Business Office.

Law Enforcement Cross-over Academy set at CJC

Certified correctional officers interested in training for a career in law enforcement, should contact Chipola Junior College immediately.

Due to the extensive application process, candidates are asked to apply well before the program begins Nov. 1. The 350-hour Cross-over to Law Enforcement academy will run Monday through Friday evenings from 5:30 to 9:30 p.m. Estimated

cost is \$625. Completers are eligible to take the state Law Enforcement examination and become certified Peace Officers.

Candidates must be at least 18 years of age, earn a passing score on the Test of Adult Basic Education (TABE) and meet FDLE requirements.

Chipola employees present at regional meeting

Chipola Junior College employees Mary Lu Andreu and Gail Hartzog presented programs at the Southeastern Association for Community College Research, 29th Annual Conference, Aug. 6-9, in Olive Branch, Mississippi.

Andreu and Hartzog led a roundtable discussion entitled, "An Effective Retention Plan: Three Years of Successful Strategies." The program was produced by CJC secretary Carole Edenfield. Andreu says, "We discussed the ways we tie retention to the mission and goals of the college, and how we encourage each unit of the college to incorporate retention into their work. By tracking A.A. degrees, A.S. degrees, certificates, minority, and success center completion data, CJC officials have noted important differences in program completion in various groups.

Hartzog presented "Simple and Sweet: Op-

erational Unit Planning that Renews an Institution and Survives SACS Scrutiny." She was invited to talk about Chipola's institutional effectiveness and operational unit planning process which gained recognition for the college during the SACS Reaffirmation Committee visit in 1998. The college received no recommendations in Section III of the SACS criteria. Since that visit, Chipola has shared their information with more than 80 schools. Hartzog led Chipola during its 10-year re-accreditation process in 1998.

Andreu is a counselor in the CJC Student Services Division. Hartzog is Chipola's director of Institutional Planning and Effectiveness.

Other speakers at the meeting included William F. Winter, former Governor of Mississippi and Robert "Bob" Scott, former Governor of North Carolina.



Chipola grad named president of FRC

Kenneth L. Connor, a 1967 CJC graduate, was recently named president of The Family Research Council, a Washington-based research group.

Connor is new to the nation's capital, but he is no stranger to politics and public policy. He has had a leading role in presidential, congressional, and gubernatorial campaigns. In 1994, he was a contender for the Republican nomination for governor of the state of Florida. As a respected trial lawyer, Connor has been in the foreground of many issues, including the pro-life movement, nursing home reform, parents' rights, adoption, and corrections reform.

He has served as President and Chairman of the Board for Florida Right to Life, Vice Chairman of Americans United for Life, and Chairman

of the Board of Care Net, which has more than 500 affiliated pregnancy care centers. Connor is affiliated with the law firm of Wilkes & McHugh, P.A., a firm nationally known for its successful representation of victims of nursing home abuse and neglect. Connor is a frequent lecturer at national and state seminars for lawyers and various health care providers. He has served as an adjunct professor at Florida State University's College of Law and is frequently invited to address college and university audiences. His work on behalf of pro-life issues has been profiled on ABC's "Prime Time Live," the MacNeil Lehrer News Hour, and CBS, ABC, NBC, and CNN news.

Connor received a bachelor's degree and law degree from Florida State University. He and his wife Amy have been married for 29 years and have four children - Kathryn, Elizabeth, Caleb, and Joshua. He is the son of Fay and the late K.B. Connor of Marianna. His sister, Gina Stuart, is a member of the CJC District Board of Trustees.

Chipola's Spurlock commits to Kansas State

Sophomore Janerio Spurlock has committed to sign a scholarship with Kansas State University.

At 6'6, 200 pounds, Spurlock was Chipola's leading scorer last season with a 20-point per game average. He was the second leading scorer in the Panhandle Conference in 2000 and earned All-Conference honors. As one of the league's top returning players Spurlock is rated as a pre-season All-American by *Street and Smith Magazine*.

A native of Cincinnati, Ohio, Spurlock averaged 22 points, 9 rebounds and 3 assists at Aiken

High. He set a school scoring record with 1,834 points, and was named Cincinnati Player of the Year in 1999.

Kansas State University, located in Manhattan, KS, is part of the Big 12 Conference. Chipola head coach Ryan Cross says, "Janerio had a lot of options. He visited Kansas in early September and really liked what he saw. They've got a new coaching staff and they're in one of the top leagues in the country. He should be able to go in and play a lot of minutes as a junior."

Customer Support Center training courses set at CJC

Chipola Junior College is offering three new courses for those interested in Customer Support Center Training.

The courses are CGS 1060—Introduction to Microcomputer Use; CET 1171—Introduction to Microcomputer Maintenance and Repair; and MNA 1161—Customer Service Training.

Classes will run Oct. 23 through Dec. 9. Courses will be taught in six-week cycles and will be offered mornings, afternoons, evenings and Saturdays in three-hour blocks.

The three courses are part of the AS Degree in Computer Information Technology. CJC dean of Workforce Development Bud Riviere says, "Completing the courses in no way guarantees employment at Sykes Enterprises; however, complet-

ing the course-work and the AS Degree would certainly enable someone to become employable in the Customer Support Center area."

Gary Cook is the CJC counselor for students interested in Customer Support Center training. Ken Griffin will serve as the One Stop Center contact for the program. Angie Tyler will direct TABE testing for the program through the CJC Success Center.

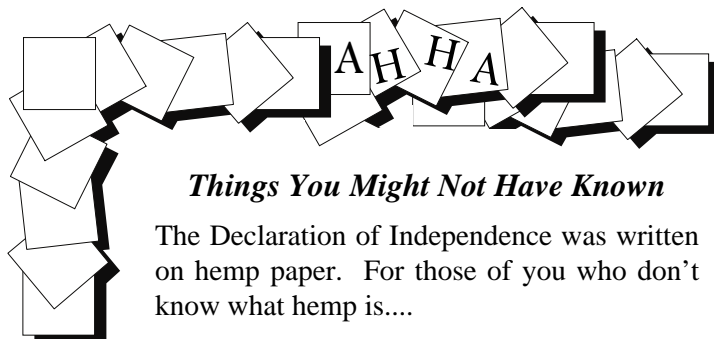
