Bush designates Career and Technical Ed Week

Governor Jeb Bush and the Florida Cabinet recently designated Feb. 14-20 as Career and Technical Education Week.

In a resolution signed Jan. 8, the state's top leaders commended the countless participants of Florida's workforce development and education system for their work and unwavering dedication in establishing and participating in a useful and efficient system of education that will prepare Florida citizens for the workplace.

Gov. Bush further urged all Floridians to become familiar with the outstanding services and

benefits offered by career and technical education programs in their communities and to support and create partnerships with these programs to insure their success. The resolution further stated that career and technical education provides Florida citizens and youth with a real-life connection between academics and technology in order to create the backbone of a well-prepared, and self-sufficient workforce for the new millennium.

The CJC District Board of Trustees approved the state resolution on Feb. 9.

Instant Relief for Piano Dropouts

"Your piano teacher might not want you to know this, but you don't need years of weekly lessons to learn piano. In just half a day you can learn enough secrets to give you years of musical enjoyment," says jazz-pianist, Jim Templeton, who will be visiting Chipola Junior College, Thursday, Feb. 18, at 6 p.m., with his Instant Piano (For Hopelessly Busy People) workshop.

The difference, Templeton says, is: regular piano teachers teach note-reading, while piano-playing professionals use chords. And dropout is the best word to describe the typical enrollee in Templeton's Chord workshops. The course is aimed at people who, disenchanted with counting, scales, and exercises, dropped piano lessons somewhere along the way. "You will learn all the chords you need to play any popular song in this one session: any style—any key," says Templeton. "If you can find middle C and know the meaning of 'Every Good Boy Does Fine,' you already know enough to enroll," he adds. "No counting, no scales, no memorizing—just

play with it, in the true sense of the word 'play.'"

Templeton, who for years taught college music, presents dozens of these workshops throughout the year, and as far away as Tampa and Anchorage. Awarded the 1993 Artist Trust Fellowship (\$5,000) in composition, he is an active jazz pianist, as well as an accomplished vibraphonist.

An integral part of the course is the accompanying cassette with workbook. "The cassette tape guides the student's practice and gives him an aural picture to focus on," says Templeton. In a high point of the workshop, students gather 'round the piano while Jim demonstrates some of the 'cheap tricks' that professional piano players employ.

The Lady Indians recorded an 82-71 win over the Lady Pirates. Sheherra Clark led Chipola with 18 points. Angela Thornton had 17, and Shannon O'Connor added 11.

Chipola dropped a tough road loss at OW on Feb. 10, by a score of 74-70. Clyde Ellis led Chipola with 16. Nash says, "This was a very

hard-fought game. We had them on the ropes a couple of times, but we weren't able to push them over. We played a good ball game, but OW is just a better team right now." OW leads the conference at 6-3.

The Lady Indians also lost their battle with the OW Lady Raiders, 80-76. Thornton led Chipola with 18. Charrise Hill had 14. Tracey Tolbert contributed 12, and Mia Taylor added 11. The Lady Indians are 17-9 overall, and 5-6 in the conference.

The top two teams in the Panhandle Conference earn a spot in the State Tournament at Chipola on March 3-6. The Indians' most recent win was a big 10-6 victory at Florida Community College at Jacksonville on Feb. 10. Chipola scored all 10 runs in first innings, including a three-run homer by Charlie Dees, and a grand slam from Cameron Likely. Chipola's winning pitcher was Buster Drasdo, who improved to 2-0 on the season.

After an season-opening loss to Lake City,

the Indians have not looked back, beating South Georgia, Darton, Southern Union and FCCJ.

The team is scheduled to host George Wallace in a pair of games on Saturday, Feb. 13, and South Georgia in a pair on Sunday, Feb. 14.
