Chipola officials attend SACS conference

Gail Hartzog, Director of Institutional Effectiveness and Planning, and Dr. Rene Tharpe, Associate Dean, took part in the 105th Annual Meeting of the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools in Atlanta, Dec. 3-6.

More than 2,500 delegates attended workshops on more than 100 topics, took action on accreditation issues, and set policy for the regional accrediting agency.

Hartzog and Tharpe provided feedback on the revision of the Commission on Colleges Criteria for accreditation. The criteria Revision Project will result in modified standards for accreditation of colleges and universities across the Southeast. The two CJC representatives also attended an Orlando preliminary session to begin groundwork for the project in October.

Featured speaker was celebrated poet and actress Manya Angelou, who also is an adjunct professor of American Studies at Wake Forest Uni-

versity, Winston-Salem, NC.

Delegates attended seminars on topics on the accreditation process, distance learning and technology issues, character education, brain-based teaching and learning, international education, and others.

Delegates included educational professionals representing more than 12,000 accredited public and private institutions enrolling nearly 11 million students in universities, colleges, high schools, middle schools and elementary schools.

Founded in 1895 and headquartered in Decatur, GA, the Southern Association is one of six regional bodies in the U.S. and works with schools and colleges in 11 Southern states, in Mexico, the Caribbean, and Central and South America. Accreditation is a non-governmental and voluntary process concerned with improving educational quality and assuring the public that member institutions meet established standards.

Chipola hoops squads jump into conference season

The Lady Indians opened the conference season with an 85-72 win at North Florida on Jan. 10.

Temecca Barnes had 21 points. **Satoya Spates** scored 20 apiece. **Tasha Mathis** and **Sowo Varney** each had 9, and **Takesha Oden** scored 8.

Chipola scored a 79-76 overtime win at Seminole CC on Jan. 3. **Mathis** led Chipola with 18. **Spates** and **Varney** had 17 apiece. **Oden** pulled in 9 rebounds and made two free throws late in the game to give the Lady Indians the three point edge. Chipola suffered a 61-57 loss to Central Florida CC on Jan. 2. The team is 1-0 in the league and 10-6 overall.

Chipola's men's team (16-2) opens the Conference season at Gulf Coast on Saturday, Jan. 13. Chipola hosts Pensacola in a pair of games on Wednesday, Jan. 17 in the Johnson Health Center. The women play at 5 p.m. The men tip off at 7:30.

Chipola is ranked third in the state and number 23 in the national poll. Several Indians are ranked



among the top players on the latest state report. **Janerio Spurlock** is the state's second leading scorer averaging 22.6 points per game. **Michael Wilder** is number nine on the list with a 19.1 average. **Lavelle Felton** is 13th with a 17.3 average. **Felton** is third in the state in free throw percentage with a .867 average, connecting on 52 of 60 attempts. **Lance Buoncristiani** is fifth in assists with a 6.6 average. **Felton** is eighth in assists with 5.3 per game. **Wilder** is eighth in steals with 42 on the year.

The Indians whipped Santa Fe CC 82-68 Jan. 9 in Gainesville. **Wilder** led all scorers with 23 points. **Felton** scored 18. **Spurlock** added 12. **Ryan Lewis** blocked eight shots during the contest.

CJC's Poole is published

"Importance of Research and Publication by Community College Librarians," a guest editorial by Dr. Carolyn E. Poole of Chipola Junior College, appears in the November 2000 issue of *College and Research Libraries*.

Dr. Poole is the first Florida community college library director to be published in this highly-regarded scholarly journal of the American Library Association. The majority of articles in the journal are contributed by tenure-track, faculty librarians at research level universities. Only 38 percent of manuscripts submitted are accepted for publication.

The purpose of the editorial is to encourage

two-year college library/learning resource specialists to initiate basic and applied research of current practices, which may subsequently improve programs and services for users as well as strengthen the theoretical foundation of librarianship. In her editorial, Dr. Poole outlines roots of the problem why community college librarians do not contribute to the professional literature, why it is important to do so, how to overcome barriers, and sources of support to conduct studies.

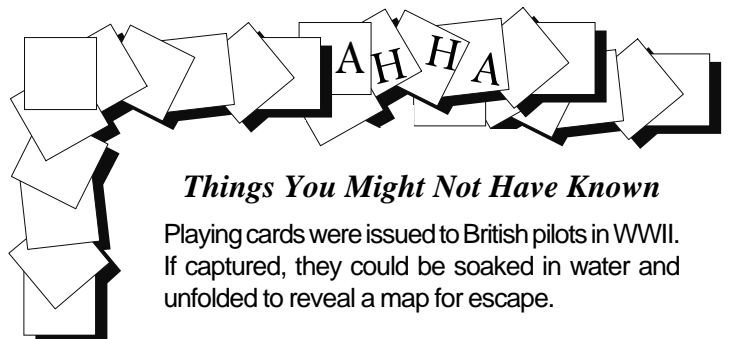
