Stuart elected Chair of Chipola Board

Gina Stuart of Marianna was elected chair of the District Board of Trustees during the board's regular meeting on June 15.

Stuart, a real estate broker, will represent Jackson County with Jeff Crawford of Greenwood, a farmer, and executive director of the Florida Peanut Producers Association, and John Padgett of Marianna, a retired property manager, and former Jackson County Commissioner.

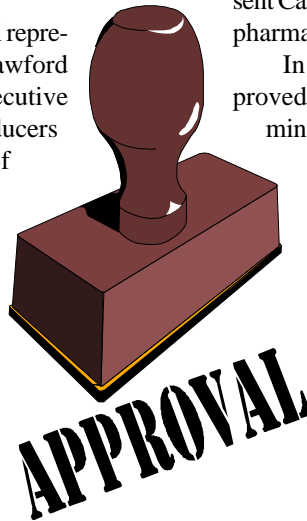
Gary Clark of Chipley was elected vice-chair of the board. Clark is vice-president of Member services for West Florida Electric Cooperative Association and a Washington County School board member. Abby Hinson of Chipley, a dental hygienist, will also represent Washington County. Holmes County trustees include Jennie Belser Goodman of Bonifay, a pharmacist, and Brenda Taylor of Bonifay, a counselor at Bonifay Elementary. Manuel Gatlin of

Blountstown, a retired medical administrator with the Department of Veterans Affairs, will represent Calhoun County. Mark Plummer, a Bristol pharmacist, will represent Liberty County.

In other business board members approved a six percent raise for career and administrative employees. The Chipola Faculty Association, the faculty's collective bargaining unit, is currently negotiating its annual contract with the college administration.

The board also approved an articulation agreement with Florida State University to offer a 2+2 Distance Learning Initiative through Chipola. FSU will offer bachelor's degree programs in Computer Science and Information Studies with CJC beginning in this Fall.

Trustees also accepted a table of personnel which included the full-time appointments of: Richard Hinson, English instructor; Charles Sirmon, coordinator of theatre; and Dr. Carolyn E. Poole, coordinator of Library Services.

Culinary Management Program at Chipola

Applications are currently being accepted for Chipola Junior College's new Culinary Management program. The two-year program of study prepares students for careers in commercial and institutional management positions leading to employment as executive chef, steward, food and beverage director, restaurant manager or caterer. The program will also provide supplemental training for persons employed in culinary occupations. The program focuses on broad, transferable skills and stresses understanding and demonstration of the following elements of the culinary industry: planning; management; finance; technical and product skills; technology; labor issues; health; safety and environmental issues.
