Outgoing Trustees honored at CJC Board Meeting

Five of Chipola's outgoing trustees were honored with resolutions of appreciation at the board's regular meeting on March 16.

CJC president Dr. Dale O'Daniel read resolutions highlighting the contributions of the trustees. Their counties and dates of appointment are as follows: E. Myron Hudson of Holmes County (1993), Gary Shuler of Calhoun County (1993), Butch Odum of Jackson County (1993), Suzanne Glass-Troutman of Jackson County (1994) and David Summers of Liberty County (1991).

Five new trustees have been appointed by Gov. Jeb Bush to replace the outgoing members. They are: John Padgett (Jackson County), Gina Stuart (Jackson County), Mark Plummer (Liberty County), Manuel Gatlin (Calhoun County) and Brenda Taylor (Holmes County). The five are awaiting Senate confirmation, which according to the Governor's office, is scheduled for April 5. Replacements for the four remaining trustees (whose terms end May 31) are expected to be

announced by early May, according to State Board of Community Colleges general counsel Sydney McKenzie. Remaining trustees include Gerald Mason (Jackson), Eddie Davis (Washington), Josephine Robinson (Washington) and Betty Feagle (Holmes).

In other business, two former CJC English instructors have agreed to transfer all rights and future income from a textbook they authored, to the college Foundation. The book, "Here's How: A Guide to Improving Language Habits," by Dr. Dorothy Clemmons and Jeanette Watford Clark, has been used by the CJC English students and other community college students for several years. Proceeds from book sales will be placed in the Dr. W.I. Throssell Endowment, which benefits the CJC English Department, especially the annual Literature/Language Festival.

In other business, the board approved a personnel agenda which included the full time ap-

The Lady Indians Softball team swept a pair of home games against Tallahassee on March 16, (1-0 and 5-2)

The wins balanced Chipola's conference mark to 2-2. The 8-13 Lady Indians are now on a four-game winning streak, the team's longest of the season.

Pitcher Kanella Piggee (4-5) held the Lady Eagles to two hits to earn the win. Kerrie Blanchard (2-1) won the second game for Chipola and was helped by a CJC's tough defense.

Tiffany Jones registered a pair of RBIs and Kim St. Pierre and Lyndsey Bieber each batted in a run. Coleman believes the team was ready to

take on its conference rivals and looks at every PHC game as a challenge.

The Lady Indians were scheduled to play at Okaloosa-Walton on March 18, and at the Wallace Community College Tournament on March 19 and 20. Chipola hosts Pensacola for a double-header on March 23 at 4 p.m. The team has a long road trip scheduled with games at North Florida on March 25; at Santa Fe (in Panama City) on March 27; on March 29, and at Tallahassee on March 30. The team returns home to host a double-header with Franklin College (Indiana) on March 31 at 2 p.m.

Chipola in the thick of conference season

If recent history repeats itself, the Chipola baseball team should still be in good shape following a pair of conference opening losses to Pensacola.

Chipola began their pre-conference season with a loss to Lake City, then rallied to win 17 straight and a total of 32.

Costly errors contributed to a 9-8 loss for Chipola at Pensacola on March 16 in the Indians' conference opener. The Indians were charged with six errors, and allowed 14 base hits for Pensacola.

Justin Lord (5-1) kept the Pirates off the scoreboard until the bottom of the fourth, when Pensacola rang up six runs. Chipola loaded the bases with no outs in the top of the fifth but came up with just one run to cut the lead to 6-2. Pensacola extended its lead to 7-2, the largest of the day, before CJC would make a late run.

Pitcher Max Havel held the Pirates to few hits while the Indians were waging a comeback. Chipola scored in four of five innings and chipped away at the lead. The Indians narrowed the game to 7-6 with a four-run rally in the sixth, but PJC scored two in the inning. Chipola scored two

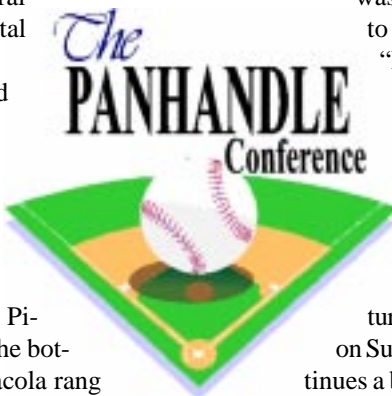
runs in the eighth to cut the difference to 9-8, but were never able to take the lead.

Chipola logged 13 hits on the night, including a Richie Smith solo home run. Michael Brown had a pair of hits and Marianna's own Jake Mathis was 3-for-4. "Defensively we need to do a better Job," said Johnson. "If we do that we'll be fine."

Chipola also dropped a home game with Pensacola 8-6 on March 17.

The Indians are 32-6 with an 0-2 Conference mark as of March 18. Chipola travels to Gulf Coast on March 20 and returns home to host the Commodores on Sunday, March 21 at 1 p.m. CJC continues a busy Spring Break schedule with games at Okaloosa Walton March 23; home against OW March 24, at 6 p.m.; at Tallahassee March 26; home against Tallahassee on March 27 at 1 p.m.; home against North Florida on March 30 at 6 p.m., and at North Florida on March 31.

The Indians play six games a week throughout the conference season that ends April 21. The top two teams in the Conference earn a berth to the state tournament in early May. Most conference games will be broadcast by Clint Cox and Russell Register on WTYS-94.1 FM.

Office Safety is important

Students and employees are reminded of the following precautions to help eliminate potential dangers in office arrangement and operation:

1. Never leave filing cabinet drawers open.
2. Never open more than one filing cabinet drawer at a time.
3. Never place broken glass, sharp objects, and pressurized containers in office waste cans. Custodial staff might be injured as they remove plastic bags or transport refuse. Contact your building supervisor who will make arrangements to place such objects in special containers.
4. Never string cords for electrical equipment

across walkways or aisles.

5. Never plug several appliances (coffee maker, crock pot, etc.) into an extension cord. Physical Plant will provide a plug strip.
6. Never lift heavy boxes, move furniture, climb ladders or attempt any strenuous activity beyond daily routine unless you have someone to assist you.
7. Never place furniture or fixtures near entryways nor around corners.
8. Never allow exposed cords or outlets in office work areas, and always report broken switch and plug covers.
