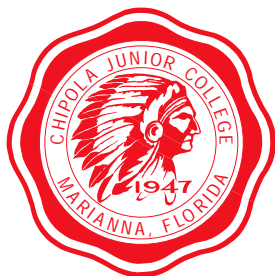

Stadslev selected top CJC Faculty/Administrator

Joan Stadslev, Director of Fine and Performing Arts, was recently selected Chipola Junior College's Faculty/Administrator of the Year.

The criteria for this first-time award states that it is intended to "recognize a faculty/administrator who routinely demonstrates exceptional job performance, takes pride in their performance, and displays an unselfish desire to consistently exceed that which is required."

Stadslev is the founding executive director of the Chipola Regional Arts Association and a founding board member of the Chipola Regional Symphony Orchestra. She has written many grants for the college's arts program, including two grants that saved the college's old Field House which was renovated into the Chipola Arts Center.

CJC president Dr. Dale O'Daniel says, "Joan is well-respected by every group at the college, from students to staff, faculty and administrators. She was chosen by her peers as the first chair of the CJC Governance Council and was re-elected for a second year. This new award is significant because the nomination came from her peers both in faculty and administration. As president, I am especially proud of the job she does. The Fine Arts Department was the only area of the college that earned a commendation from the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools during their 10-year re-accreditation visit. I be-

lieve this commendation can be attributed to Joan's leadership."

Stadslev has taught Chorus, Show Choir, and Applied Voice, and has served as musical director for many CJC productions during her 20 years of service. She has coordinated many successful seasons of the Chipola Artist Series. Additionally, she has served on numerous college committees. She is a member of the Council of Chipola Educators and the Florida Association of Community Colleges.

She earned degrees at Florida State University, including a Bachelor of Music and a Master of Science in Higher Education Administration. At FSU, she was tapped by Garnet Key and served as president of Sigma Alpha Iota (women's music honorary). She completed additional coursework in literature and art at FSU, and in music at the Westminster Choir College in Princeton, NJ. She was also selected as a vocal participant at the internationally recognized Colorado's Aspen Music Festival.

Stadslev is presently serving as Music Representative to the Florida Community College Activities Association. Regionally she has performed as an oratorio soloist and presently serves as an adjudicator for Choral and Solo/Ensemble Festivals. In 1995 she was the recipient of the Foundation for Academic Educators grant.

FSU and CJC offer Bachelor's degree program

Chipola's University Center and Florida State University are working together to enable students to earn a bachelors degree without moving to Tallahassee.

Beginning Fall semester 1999, anyone with an AA degree can enroll in classes leading to a degree from FSU's Department of Computer Science. Three majors are available: Computer Science, Software Engineering and Information Studies. These supported distance learning programs are designed especially for part-time students who cannot attend regularly scheduled classes. The courses feature specially designed, state-of-the-art instructional materials, local academic facilities and resources and mentor support.

Thursday, June 3 at 6 p.m., CDT in room D300 at Chipola. Todd Wagar from FSU and personnel from Chipola will present information about these three bachelor's degrees. Advising and registration issues, and plans for the 1999-2000 school year also will be addressed.

FSU's application deadline for Fall 1999 is July 16. Early registration for Fall classes also is in July. Persons interested in this new opportunity are encouraged to attend the meeting. CJC also collaborates with FSU to offer a Bachelor's Degree in Nursing for registered nurses with two-year degrees.

Occupational Therapy Assistant program on go

The Division of Health Sciences, under the direction of Mrs. Kathy Wheeler, is pleased to announce the accepting of students for the college's first Occupational Therapy Assistant Class.

Applicants should request an application packet and Criteria for the Essay and Interview from the Occupational Therapy Assistant Department. Essay and Application deadline has been extended to June 15. The twelve occupational therapy assistant candidates will be chosen by June 30 for the Fall Semester of 1999.

The program was recently granted Developing Status, the first step of accreditation from the Accreditation Council for Occupational Therapy Education (ACOTE) of the American Occupational Therapy Association (AOTA), located at 4720 Montgomery Lane, P.O. Box 31220, Bethesda, MD 20824-1220; phone (301) 652-AOTA. Once full accreditation has been obtained, program graduates will be able to sit for the National Certification examination for the occupational therapy assistant administered by the National Board for the exam. Successful candidates will earn certification

as a Certified Occupational Therapy Assistant (COTA).

"Occupational Therapy is an exciting field, which works with a person's ability to do for themselves in the areas of self-care, work and leisure," says Wanda Lowe, OTA Program director. "After a traumatic injury or illness, the road to recovery can be a long one. Imagine not being able to brush your hair without concentrating, like before you developed Alzheimer's, or suffered a stroke, spinal cord injury or traumatic brain injury. Occupational therapy can make the journey shorter and help to ease the frustration most people feel when they can't do things for themselves. Occupational therapy not only shortens recovery time, it helps people to become more self-sufficient by teaching them new ways to perform job life tasks despite their physical disabilities. Occupational therapy can help them gain the confidence to get on with their lives."
