Former CJC pitcher brings home gold medal

Tim Young, a former Chipola Junior College baseball player, was part of the **Olympic Baseball** team that captured the United States' first-ever gold medal in baseball with a 4-0 win over Cuba on Sept. 27.

The Cubans were favorites in Sydney against the U.S. team made up of minor-leaguers. The Americans were dominant against Cuba despite qualifying for the final game in a ninth-inning thriller against South Korea on Sept. 26. Cuba had beaten the U.S. 6-1 on Sept. 23. Cuba had won both gold medals since baseball became an official Olympic sport in 1992.

Young pitched in three games during the Olympics. He faced one batter in the ninth inning of Team USA's 4-2 win over Italy. He struck out one and walked one in USA's 6-2 win over The Netherlands. He walked one batter in USA's 4-0 win over Korea.

Young was a factor in two of Team USA's six exhibition games before the Olympics. He pitched 2 1/3 innings and allowed one hit, one run (1 ER), one walk and three strikeouts. Opponents batted .111

(1-for-9) against the lefty. In the USA's 3-1 win over Australia, Young threw 1 1/3 innings, allowing one run, one hit, one walk and one strikeout. Two days later, he recorded a perfect inning of relief (2 K) in the USA's 17-0 win over South Africa.

The 26 year-old left-handed pitcher who now plays for the **Boston Red Sox** is part of the first group of professional athletes ever fielded for a U.S. Olympic baseball squad.

Former Los Angeles Dodgers manager **Tommy Lasorda** coached the U.S. team.

Young spent two years at **Chipola (1993 and 1994)**, where he compiled a 14-9 record and 2.94 career ERA. He is a 1992 graduate of **Liberty County High School** (Bristol, FL) where he was a three-year baseball letterman.

He is the son of Dennis and Kathy Young of Bristol.

From Chipola, Young went on to the **University of Alabama** where he led the Crimson Tide to the College World Series in 1996, going 11-3, 2.73 and leading the Southeastern Conference in wins. He pitched in 49 career games and compiled a 17-6 record and nine career saves. He pitched 153 career innings, striking out 149 hitters.

Due to the extensive application process, candidates are asked to apply well before the program begins Nov. 1. The 350-hour Cross-over to Law Enforcement academy will run Monday through Friday evenings from 5:30 to 9:30 p.m. Estimated

cost is \$625. Completers are eligible to take the state Law Enforcement examination and become certified Peace Officers.

Candidates must be at least 18 years of age, earn a passing score on the Test of Adult Basic Education (TABE) and meet FDLE requirements.

Chipola theater in rehearsal for *The Foreigner*

The Chipola Junior College Theatre will present "The Foreigner" on Nov. 2, 3, and 4, at 7:30 p.m. and Nov. 5 at 2 p.m.

Directed by CJC Theatre Coordinator Charles Sirmon, this Fall production continues the proud tradition of excellent theatrical productions staged by CJC drama students for more than four decades. An award-winning comedy by the late Milwaukee playwright Larry Shue, "The Foreigner" has been described by critics as "foot-stompingly funny...hilarious...and the most enjoyable night of theatre in years."

"The Foreigner" demonstrates what can happen when a group of devious characters must deal with a stranger who (they think) knows no English. The play is set in a rural Georgia fishing lodge often visited by Sgt. "Froggy" LeSeuer, a British demolition expert who runs training sessions at a nearby army base. Froggy has brought along the pathologically shy Charlie who is overcome with fear at the thought of making conversation with strangers. So Froggy, before departing, tells the guests that Charlie is from an exotic foreign coun-

try and speaks no English. Once alone the fun really begins, as the guests attempt to teach Charlie to speak proper English. Charlie also overhears more than he should - the evil plans of a sinister, two-faced minister and his redneck associate; the fact that the minister's pretty fiance is pregnant; and other damaging revelations made with the belief that Charlie doesn't understand the language. The fact that he does fuels the comedy of the play and sets up the wild climax.

The CJC cast includes: Charlie Baker by Jaromy Henry of Donalsonville, GA; Froggy LeSeuer by Chris Bishop of Marianna; Rev. Marshall by Brandon Bittner of Blountstown; Owen Musser by Charles Sirmon of Dothan, AL; Ellard Simms by Rusty Miller of Ponce De Leon, FL; Catherine Simms by Amber Williams of Graceville, FL; Betty Meeks by Marsha Kent of Cottondale. Assistant director is Ashley Guy of Marianna.

Tickets for the hit comedy will be on sale Oct. 18 in the CJC Business Office. Tickets are \$7 and 18 and under \$5. CJC students and staff get one free advance ticket.

Boston Pops conductor to perform at Chipola

Boston Pops conductor Keith Lockhart, will perform at the Chipola Junior College Theater, Monday, **Oct. 9**, at 7 p.m.

Only the third conductor of the Boston Pops Orchestra, Lockhart follows in the footsteps of such luminaries as Arthur Feidler and John Williams. In his lively presentation, *Why I Sing in the Shower*, Lockhart discusses this legacy as well as his dedication to making the art of classical music accessible to everyone, especially children.

Born in Poughkeepsie, NY, in 1959, Lockhart began his musical studies with piano lessons at the age of seven. He holds degrees from Furman University, and Carnegie-Mellon University. He studied piano with John Noel Roberts, Gwendolyn Stevens, and Maria-Rgina Sidhofer of the Vienna Hochschule. His training as a conductor includes study with Istvan Jaray, Otto-Werner Mueller, Harold Farberman and Werner Torkanowsky. He holds honorary doctorates from The Boston Conservatory and Northeastern University.

Lockhart leaves music lovers entranced during his rousing appearances on PBS's "Evening at the Pops" and A & E's annual "Holiday at Pops" and "Pop Goes the Fourth" concerts. Lockhart devotes much of his spare time sharing his love for



music with his younger fans. As conductor of the Boston Symphony Orchestra Youth Concerts, he leads 15 educational concerts a year for school children and their families.

Lockhart is the first event in the 2000-01 Chipola Artist Series. Three other performances are scheduled. **The Chvatal/Kritzer Duo** will perform **Nov. 14**. Soprano, Janet Chvatal, (and star of the *Phantom of the Opera*) in Vienna, teams up with top classical guitarist, Scott Kritzer.

Chicago City Limits, comedy and improvisation, hits the CJC stage **Jan. 8**. New York's longest running comedy revue Chicago City Limits raises improvisational theatre to an art form.

The Florida Vocal Arts Ensemble, will perform **Jan. 30**. Comprised of five FSU music faculty, members perform folk song arrangements of Beethoven to New American works.

Season tickets—\$40—are available in the CJC Fine Arts Department. Individual event tickets—\$12 for adults, \$8 for 18 and under, and \$4 for CJC students—will be available two weeks prior to performances at the CJC Business Office.

Young was **drafted by the Montreal Expos** in the 1996 draft. He got off to a fast start in his pro career, going 1-0 with 0.31 ERA in 27 games for Vermont (A), saving 18 games and earning New York-Penn League All-Star honors. He made his major league debut with Expos in '98, but after undergoing surgery for a torn left labrum he was released by the Expos that same year.

He **signed with the Red Sox** as free agent in February of '99 and went 4-4 that season for Trenton (AA). He appeared in 31 games with the Tren-

ton (NJ) Thunder of the Eastern League.

This season, Young has spent time at both Triple-A Pawtucket and with the Boston Red Sox. He has pitched eight games with Boston, allowing seven hits and recording six strikeouts in seven innings. With the **Triple-A PawSox**, Young has appeared in 30 games, compiling a 1-1 record with six saves and a 1.93 ERA. He entered this season with a 2.33 career minor league ERA with 266 strikeouts in 209 innings, giving up just 148 hits.

The three courses are part of the AS Degree in Computer Information Technology. CJC dean of Workforce Development Bud Riviere says, "Completing the courses in no way guarantees employment at Sykes Enterprises; however, complet-

ing the course-work and the AS Degree would certainly enable someone to become employable in the Customer Support Center area."

Gary Cook is the CJC counselor for students interested in Customer Support Center training. Ken Griffin will serve as the One Stop Center contact for the program. Angie Tyler will direct TABE testing for the program through the CJC Success Center.

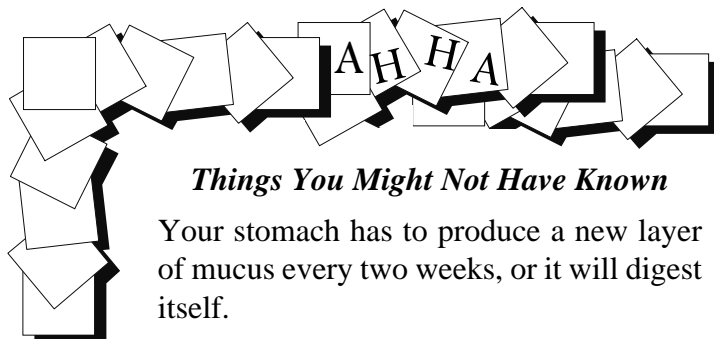
