Former CJC baseball player to make Olympic debut

Tim Young, a former Chipola baseball player, is representing the United States on the **Olympic Baseball** team.

The 26 year-old left-handed pitcher who now plays for the **Boston Red Sox** is part of the first group of professional athletes ever fielded for a U.S. Olympic baseball squad.

Former Los Angeles Dodgers manager **Tommy Lasorda** will coach the U.S. team which will open Olympic play against Japan at Homebush Bay in Sydney Olympic Park on Sunday, Sept. 17. Olympic teams will face each other once in round-robin play with the top four advancing to the semifinals on Sept. 26. The semifinal winners will meet for the gold medal on Sept. 27.

Young spent two years at **Chipola (1993 and 1994)**, where he compiled a 14-9 record and 2.94 career ERA. He is a 1992 graduate of **Liberty County High School** (Bristol, FL) where he was a three-year baseball letterman. He is the son of Dennis and Kathy Young of Bristol.

From Chipola, Young went on to the **University of Alabama** where he led the Crimson Tide to the College World Series in 1996, going 11-3, 2.73 and leading the

Southeastern Conference in wins. He pitched in 49 career games and compiled a 17-6 (.739) record with a 2.35 ERA and nine career saves. He pitched 153 career innings and allowed 130 hits and 58 runs (40 ER), while walking 49 and striking out 149 hitters.

Young was **drafted by the Montreal Expos** in the 19th round of the 1996 draft.

He got off to a fast start in his pro career, going 1-0 with 0.31 ERA in 27 games for Vermont (A), saving 18 games and earning New York-Penn League All-Star honors. He made his major league debut with Expos in '98, but after undergoing surgery for a torn left labrum he was released by the Expos that same year.

He **signed with the Red Sox** as free agent in February of '99 and went 4-4 that season for Trenton (AA). He appeared in 31 games with the Trenton (NJ) Thunder of the Eastern League.

This year, Young has spent time at both Triple-A Pawtucket and with the Boston Red Sox. He pitched eight games with Boston, allowing seven hits and recording six strikeouts in seven innings. With the **Triple-A PawSox**, Young has appeared in 30 games, compiling a 1-1 record with six saves and a 1.93 ERA. He entered this sea

UF strictly enforcing application deadlines

The University of Florida announced earlier this week its overenrollment for the Fall 2000 semester. Students who wish to transfer to UF for the Spring 2001 semester, should be advised that the enrollment management council will strictly enforce application deadlines.

For the past 2-3 years, UF has added another 30 days or so to the deadlines for fall and spring

transfer admission applications, and flexible with credentials deadlines as well. That will not be the case in the future.

The deadline for spring transfer applications is September 29. Students not meeting this deadline with a complete application packet will not be considered for transfer.

Law Enforcement Cross-over Academy set at CJC

Certified correctional officers interested in training for a career in law enforcement, should contact Chipola Junior College immediately.

Due to the extensive application process, candidates are asked to apply well before the program begins Nov. 1. The 350-hour Cross-over to Law Enforcement academy will run Monday through Friday evenings from 5:30 to 9:30 p.m. Estimated

cost is \$625. Completers are eligible to take the state Law Enforcement examination and become certified Peace Officers.

Candidates must be at least 18 years of age, earn a passing score on the Test of Adult Basic Education (TABE) and meet FDLE requirements.

The Series is funded through Chipola's Performing Arts Fund, and with grants from the National Endowment for the Arts, the Southern Arts Federation, the Florida Division of Cultural Affairs, the Chipola Regional Arts Association, corporate donors, and through ticket sales.

Season tickets—\$40 for all four events—are available in the CJC Fine Arts Department. Season tickets entitle holders to same seat reserved seats, invitations to the "Meet The Artist" receptions, subscription to the CRAA arts calendar, and early ticket-renewal next year. A limited number of individual event tickets will be available two weeks prior to each performance at the CJC Business Office. son with a 2.33 career minor league ERA with 266 strikeouts in 209 innings, giving up just 148 hits.

Young, whose side-winding delivery has made him a left-handed specialist, said it is an honor to play for his country. "And being able to represent the Boston Red Sox and the Pawtucket Red Sox and the fans who have supported me all year, you can't ask for anything more to repay them," Young said. "I'm happy and excited, and overwhelmed."

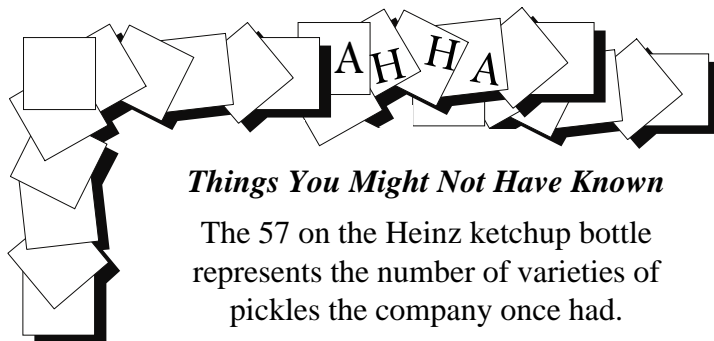
