CJC Success Center helps students succeed

The CJC Success Center provides a modern approach to improving basic skills for success in today's academic world.

Success Center coordinator Angie Tyler, says, "The returning student will find the Success Center very helpful in preparing for a future

at Chipola. Along with basic skills review, students may receive career assessment, learning styles inventory, and study skills instruction."

Trained personnel assist students in determining any academic weakness that might prevent them from achieving their goals. Once an area

is identified, an individualized prescription of work is developed to correct problem areas.

Tyler, explains, "The Success Center is not like a regular classroom. Students work at their own pace with classroom materials (books, audiovisual equipment, laser discs, and computer software) provided. Center computers are loaded with Skills Bank 4 and Cornerstone. Instructors and staff are available to help throughout the learning process."

The Center accepts students with or without a high school diploma, while preparing for their program of study. Students also can prepare to take the GED with the computer program GED 2001 and written practice tests.

> The Success Center features open enrollment, which allows students to enroll anytime during the year. Most students pay a \$2 ID fee when prepar-

> > ing for the GED or for most technical programs. The length of the class depends upon the student and his or her goal. Students are finished once they reach their goals.

The Test of Adult Ba-

sic Education (TABE) is offered in the Center, weekdays at 8:15 a.m., and Tuesday and Thursday evenings at 6 p.m.

The Center is open Monday through Friday, from 8 a.m. to 2:30 p.m., and Tuesday and Thursday evenings from 6 to 9 p.m.

Traffic citations now being issued

World famous Cowboy Poet to perform at Chipola

Buckaroo Poet **Waddie Mitchell**, will bring his poems and stories to life in the Chipola Theater on Tuesday, Sept. 21, at 7 p.m., as the opening show of the college's 1999-2000 Millennium Artist Series.

Mitchell appeared on the Chipola stage nine years ago to a sell-out audience and is being brought back by popular demand.

Waddie Mitchell was a real cowboy who became a world-renowned cowboy storyteller and poet, enchanting contemporary audiences with tales of life in the rugged West. He was born Bruce Douglas Mitchell on the enormous Horseshoe Ranch, located 30 miles south of Elko, Nevada. Young Bruce, nicknamed "Waddie" (a synonym for 'cowboy') by his father, spent most of his time with real cowboys and at night listened to their stories and memorized their poems. He dropped out of school at age 16 to become a full-time wrangler and chuck wagon driver. He was drafted into the Army and was stationed at Fort Carson, Colorado on a 24, 000-acre ranch where he broke and trained horses for the U.S. Cavalry. While working as the foreman of a ranch, Mitchell appeared in an early-'80s PBS Documentary about the last real cowboys in America, "The Vanishing Breed." The documentary featured some of Mitchell's own poetry, and Johnny Carson invited him to visit "The Tonight Show." Mitchell didn't even know who Carson was, but he was a big hit on the show and later returned several times.

He also appeared on several other programs,

including Larry King's radio show and a National Geographic special. In 1984, he and pal Hal Cannon organized the first Elko Cowboy Poetry Gathering. Two thousand people attended the first year and by 1994, the attendance soared to nearly 14,000. Later in 1984, Mitchell recorded his first album of poetry. His second album sold over 10,000 copies. In 1992, Mitchell was one of the first artists to record on Warner Brothers' newly established Warner Western label with Lone Driftin' Rider. He and colleague Don Edwards embarked upon an extensive promotional tour of festivals, concert halls, schools and universities to sell the album and to educate audiences about their nearly extinct way of life. Mitchell released his second Warner album, Buckaroo Poet, in 1994. He next appeared as a guest host on VH1's "Country, Country" show. He also won numerous honors for his poetry and storytelling, and was inducted into the Cowboy Poets and Singers' Hall of Fame.

Three other Artist Series performances are scheduled this season, including The Scholars of London, a British unaccompanied vocal quartet on Oct.11; Double Exposure, violin virtuosi Thomas Bowes and composer/pianist Eleanor Alberga on Feb. 28, 2000, and the drama, "To Kill a Mockingbird," on March 30, 2000.

Season tickets are \$40 for all four events. Individual event tickets—\$12 for adults and \$8 for ages 18 and under—are available at the Chipola Book Store, at 718-2258.

Chipola will be the site of a Small Business Innovation Research (SBIR) regional workshop on Tuesday, Sept. 28.

The purpose of the workshop is to inform businesses and individuals of grant funds that are available for various projects in market research, business diversification and product development.

More than 200 industry professionals from North Florida, South Alabama and South Georgia are expected to attend the seminar which runs from 8:30 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. Materials, breakfast and lunch are included in the \$85 registration fee.

The workshop will provide business and individuals with opportunities to: learn how to access available funding; hear from SBIR winners, specialists, and managers; interact with potential SBIR partners from industry, universities and federal agencies; identify potential partnerships with entrepreneurial companies; and learn ways to develop strategic partnerships for the award-winning process.

SBIR is designed to stimulate technology development in the private sector. Proposals are solicited by federal agencies reflecting their technology needs. These agencies award more than \$1 billion annually to the SBIR/STTR program.

Artist Series season tickets on sale

Season tickets are now available for the 1999-2000 Millennium Artist Series at Chipola Junior College.

The four-event series opens **Sept. 21** with **Waddie Mitchell, Buckaroo Poet**. *Western Horseman*, reports that "Waddie Mitchell is probably the most recognized real cowboy in the world today." He performed on the Chipola stage nine years ago to a sell-out audience, and has appeared on The Tonight Show, Larry King Live, Good Morning America and in *Life Magazine*.

The **Scholars of London**, a British unaccompanied vocal quartet will perform **Oct.11**. Considered one of the world's musical treasures, the group will present a sparkling and entertaining performance of music that spans five centuries. The Scholars have performed at New York's Lincoln Center, London's Royal Festival Hall and the Sydney Opera House.

On Feb. 28, Double Exposure, will perform Baroque, classical, and romantic masterpieces. This popular duo combines the talents of two of Great Britain's most popular musicians—violin virtuosi Thomas Bowes and composer/pianist Eleanor Alberga. Bowes performed as a soloist with the London Philharmonic, and Alberga has

performed at Royal Albert Hall, Queen Elizabeth Hall and Convent Garden.

The series ends with a true classic of American literature "To Kill a Mockingbird" on March 30, performed by Looking Glass Productions, Inc. This professional troop brings new life this literary masterpiece with a message of hope through fears, prejudice and pride.

The Series is funded through Chipola's Performing Arts Fund, and with grants from the National Endowment for the Arts, the Southern Arts Federation, the Florida Division of Cultural Affairs, the Chipola Regional Arts Association, corporate donors, and through ticket sales.

Season tickets—\$40 for all four events—are available in the CJC Fine Arts Department. Season tickets entitle holders to same seat reserved seats, invitations to the "Meet The Artist" receptions, subscription to the CRAA arts calendar, and early ticket-renewal next year. A limited number of individual event tickets will be available prior to each performance at the Chipola Book Store at \$12 for adults and \$8 for ages 18 and under.
