## Chipola Foundation holds annual meeting

Marianna dentist Dr. Larry Cook was named president of the Chipola Foundation at the foundation's annual meeting on Jan. 13. Kenneth Stoutamire was elected vice president. Laban Bontrager was also named to the board.

A Board of Directors with 29 current members representing Chipola's five-county district oversees the Foundation. Board members include: Dr. Dale O'Daniel, Jeff Crawford, Suzanne Glass-

Troutman, Dinorah Kranker, Allen Clark, Bryan Craven, Julie Fuqua, Alice Pendergrass, Terry Stone, Susan Hudson, Larry Cook, Laban Bontrager, Karin Dunn, Joe Fagan, Jason Gilmore, Carol Jean Crawford, June Manor, Sharon McCrone, Linda O'Bryan, Margaret Gilmore, Tom Wilder, IV, Ruth McCrary, Randy Free, Brook Donaldson, Phil McCrary, Colby Peel, Kenneth Stoutamire, Harry Bell, III, and James Hart.

During the Fall and Spring semesters, some 611 students have been awarded more than \$525,000 in scholarship funds through the Foundation. The 1998-99 annual audit

lists total assets of more than \$8.3 million. During the past two years, the Foundation has helped the college in its technology initiative, by purchasing computers for students. Most recently, the Foundation agreed to help purchase a new bus to be used by student groups.

Foundation director Julie Fuqua reports that the majority of the Foundation's assets consist of scholarship endowments established by

families and organizations throughout Chipola's five-county district. The Foundation manages 101 endowed funds, and some 70 active funds-in/funds-out scholarships. The Foundation's investment and spending policy requires that 5% of the Foundation's assets be held locally in Chipola's five-county district.

The Foundation also provides tax-sheltered giving opportunities for donors. Fuqua says that in addition to general donations, memorial gifts have become a popular gesture for memorializing someone. The family receives notification that a do

## Will Rogers to perform at Chipola Chautauqua

Humorist Will Rogers will come to life in a presentation at the CJC Theater on Monday, Jan. 31, at 11 a.m.

The performance is part of the National Chautauqua Tour, American Humorist Series, which debuted in the summer of 1998 in the Great Plains. Chautauqua (shuh-taw-kwa) began in 1874 on the banks of Lake Chautauqua in upstate New York and has developed into a thoughtful, educational, entertaining event.

Will Rogers (1879 to 1935) was a cowboy, actor, newspaper columnist, radio personality and humorist. As one of the most well known voices of his time, he traveled the world, knew all the big men of his age, joked about presidents and became known as "America's apostle for common sense."

Rogers once said he was "curious to see how far a competent man could go in politics . . . it has never been tried before."

Doug Watson, professor of English at Oklahoma Baptist University, will portray the character of Rogers. Audience members will also have the opportunity to talk with the scholar when he steps out of character to discuss his ideas on this important historical figure.

The performance was organized by the Florida Humanities Council and comes to Chipola through the generosity of several groups. Through a grant from Chipola's Staff and Program Development Committee, the CJC performances are free and open to the public. Chipola's Chautauqua also will feature the characters of Langston Hughes,

## Chipola to document folklife traditions

Chipola has received a grant from the State of Florida to document local folklife traditions in the Florida Panhandle.

Anthropologist Laura Ogden will be in the region talking to people about these traditions. She will be working in Calhoun, Jackson, Liberty, Holmes, and Washington counties. Ogden, a fifth-generation Floridian, has spent the past six years documenting local traditions in Florida and has written a book about camping and hunting in the Everglades during the 1930's. She looks forward to learning more about the history and traditions of the Panhandle.

Folklife traditions are skills and crafts

that are passed down through families and are important to the community-such as basket-making, cane grinding, quilting, boat building, tool and knife making. Other folklife traditions include ways people make their living, which are unique and special to the region-such as timbering, farming, the turpentine business, fish camps, hunting and old-fashioned tourist stops. These traditions also include the ways people celebrate, including square dancing, gospel singing, clogging, music and storytelling. Many of these traditions have been practiced in the Panhandle for many generations, while other folklife traditions are new to the

region. Researchers are also interested in new traditions brought to the Panhandle from other parts of the country, or from other countries.

Ogden says, "As the world changes, many of these traditions become forgotten." She is asking area residents to help preserve these traditions. nation has been made in memory of their loved one. Donors also may designate the purpose of a memorial contribution, such as a library book, scholarship, or for fine arts, or other programs. All donors receive a confirmation card for tax purposes.

In addition to private donations, the Foundation receives money from the state of Florida's matching fund program for endowed scholarships. The Foundation may apply for a \$4 match for every \$6 in privately donated funds.

One large source of scholarships within the Foundation is The McLendon Educational Trust. Bequeathed by the late Violet McLendon of Marianna, scholar-

ships from this fund are awarded on the basis of merit and financial need. A committee reviews all applications for McLendon funds, which provide annual awards of approximately \$140,000. The Foundation also receives approximately \$12,000 in McLendon Music Scholarship funds.

The Foundation also has emergency loan accounts set up by three individuals that loan money against Pell Grants or student loans. Students may receive up to \$200 to be repaid at 2% interest.

The Foundation is a Federal 501c3 non-profit corporation and a state non-profit sales tax exempt organization chartered in July of 1980 for the purpose of raising funds

to benefit Chipola and its students.

## Chipola hoops teams host Pensacola Saturday

Both Chipola hoops host Pensacola in a pair of games at the Milton H. Johnson Health Center on Saturday, Jan. 29.

The evening is billed as Washington County Appreciation night with all students and residents of Washington County admitted free to both games. Both teams travel to Gulf Coast on Tuesday, Jan. 25.

The Indians slipped to 2-2 in the conference and 17-5 overall with a 105-95 loss at Tallahassee on Jan. 18. TCC jumped out to a 22 point lead in the first half and never trailed. Head coach Ryan Cross said, "We fought hard in the second half. We had opportunities, we just didn't make some shots. I'm proud of the way our kids battled back."

The Lady Indians also lost to Tallahassee, 87-58. Tina Stapleton led Chipola with a game-high 28 points. The Lady Indians travel to North Florida on Saturday, Jan. 22.

Both CJC squads scored upset wins over Okaloosa-Walton on Jan. 15 in Marianna. The Lady Indians racked up an 80-70 win over OW. The Indians beat OW,

71-64.

As of Jan. 20, the Indians are ranked fourth in the state with a 17-5 overall record. Several CJC players are listed among the state's top players. Will Campbell leads the state in rebounding with 12.86 per game. Michael Hardaway leads the state in assists with 11.15 per game, and is fourth in steals with a 2.95 average. Janerio Spurlock is the fifth leading scorer averaging 20.44 points per game.

The Lady Indians are ranked eighth in the state at 2-3 in the league, and 13-7 overall. Sheherah Clark is second in the state in assists with a 5.63 average, and is fourth in steals. Keelee Traylor is third in rebounding, averaging 13.05 per game. Tina Stapleton is number 13 in rebounding.

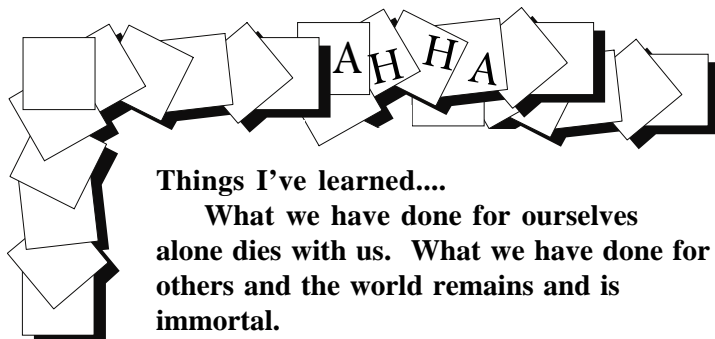
