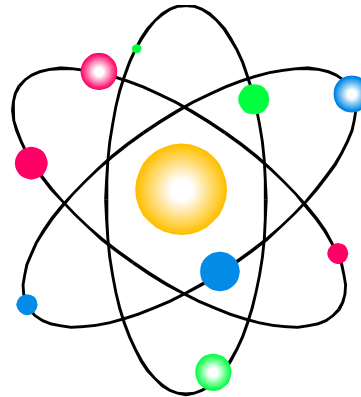
Students from the CJC Science Club will present demonstrations from science classes and honors projects for fair participants on Thursday,

The Awards Ceremony begins at 10 a.m. on Friday in the college Theater.

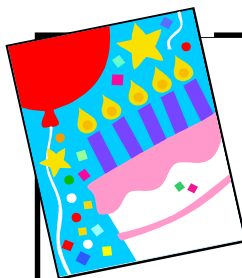

Enrollment up at Chipola for Spring

Enrollment at Chipola Junior College is up this Spring by nearly five percent over last year.

Exactly 4.97 percent more students registered during Spring 2001 compared to the same period for Spring 2000. Headcount also is up to 1,647 total students compared to 1,569 for Spring 2000. Full Time Equivalency (FTE), an average calculation of the number of hours students take, increased 4.13 percent from 414 to 431.

CJC president Dr. Dale O'Daniel attributes the positive trend to a number of factors. "We have made a concerted effort to make our programs more accessible to students. We're offering more academic classes, more dual-enrollment classes and a wider variety of distance-learning courses. Chipola also has a very successful Foundation that helps

break down financial barriers. The generosity of our local donors help hundreds of students pay for college each year."

O'Daniel also reports that presence of the University Center @ Chipola has positively affected enrollment because students must take freshman and sophomore level pre-requisites at CJC to qualify for these four-year programs.

Though Chipola's academic classes are well underway, students may continue to register for several Workforce Development programs and Continuing Education courses throughout the semester.

Chipola to host Okaloosa-Walton for Jackson County night

Chipola hosts Okaloosa-Walton on Wednesday, Feb. 7, in a pair of big conference games. The evening is billed as Jackson County Appreciation Night with all residents of the county admitted free to both games. The women play at 5:30. The men tip-off at 7:30.

Chipola improved to 19-4 and 3-2 in the Panhandle Conference with an 89-75 win over Gulf Coast on Jan. 31.

Michael Wilder led Chipola with 30 points. Wayne Bransom had 18 and Janerio Spurlock added 13. The win moves the Indians into a tie for second place with Okaloosa Walton.

Chipola travels to Pensacola on Feb. 3. After the first round of men's conference play TCC is 6-0. OW is 3-2 with losses to TCC and PJC. CJC is 3-2 with wins over PJC and GCC and losses to OW and TCC. PJC is 2-4. GCC is 0-6. The top two teams in the Panhandle Conference earn a spot in the state tournament, March 7 at Chipola.

The Lady Indians lost a tough-fought game to Gulf Coast 76-71 on Jan. 31. Leading scorers for

Chipola were D'Leisha Cockerham from Grand Ridge with 14, Satoya Spates from Malone with 13, Kamika Collins with 13, and Tasha Mathis with 10. Heach coach Jason Keene says, "We played a heck of a game tonight. I thought it really was the best game we played all year. If we play this well from here on out, we'll give ourselves in a good chance to make the state tournament."

The Lady Indians are 3-4 in the league and 12-10 overall. The top three women's teams in the Panhandle Conference earn a berth in the state tournament. The Lady Indians chalked up a 69-54 win over North Florida on Jan. 27. Sowo Varney led CJC with 17. Temecca Barnes scored 16. Cockerham had 15. Collins added 10.

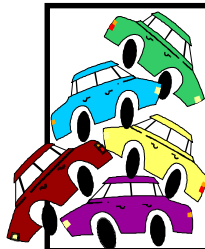
Chipola's Foreigner wins top awards

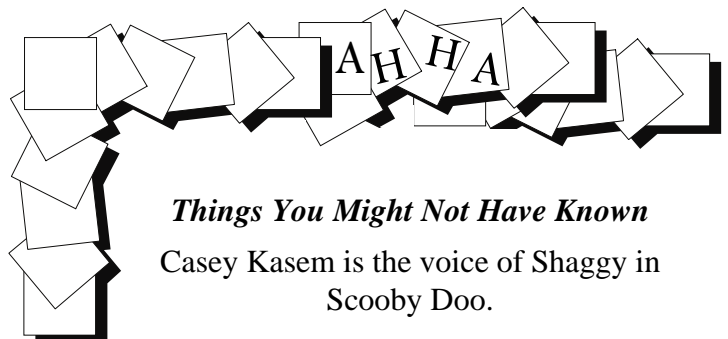
New Parking Rules
