Hartzog tapped for Faculty/Admin Award

Gail Hartzog is the recipient of the February Faculty/Administrator of the Month Award.

Hartzog has served as director of Institutional Effectiveness and Planning at CJC since 1993. She began her tenure at CJC as an English and speech teacher in 1981.

Hartzog led Chipola during its 10-year re-accreditation process with the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools (SACS) in 1998. Chipola's institutional effectiveness and operational unit planning process earned recognition for the college during the SACS visit. Hartzog is a much sought after speaker and adviser on the re-accreditation process and has shared Chipola's planning, accountability, and accreditation documents with more than 80 colleges.

Hartzog has coordinated Chipola's periodic community listening sessions and helped organize the Governance Council, a student and employee

group which coordinates the college's committees and makes recommendations to the college president on a variety of issues.

The colleague who nominated Hartzog for the award says, "Gail is a rare gem in today's world. She is the epitome of trust and dependability. She has demonstrated outstanding achievement in her field and has gained public recognition for her accomplishments."

Hartzog's husband Ronnie is Coordinator of the University of Florida's Beef Research Unit in Greenwood. They have two daughters, Christy a CJC alumna, and Allison, a freshman at CJC. The family resides in Chipley where they are active in church and civic activities.

The award includes a plaque, reserved parking for a month, a \$300 bonus, and a \$50 gift certificate from the College Book Store. Monthly winners are eligible for the annual award.

Chipola cafeteria provides meals and training

Chipola's newly remodeled Cafeteria is now open for meals, weekdays for breakfast, from 7 a.m. to 9:30 a.m. and for lunch, from 11 a.m. to 1:30 p.m.

Morrison Health Care Food Service employees, located in Jackson Hospital, prepare the meals, with assistance from students in Chipola's Culinary Management program. The \$3.49 Luncheon Special includes the entrée of the day, two sides, a roll and beverage. A salad bar and ala carte choices are also available.

CJC chef/instructor Mark Panichella says, "Our students have played a major part in the opening of the cafeteria. We've got a great group of motivated, hard-working students." The two-year program in Culinary Management prepares graduates for careers in a variety of areas in the food service industry. Panichella says, "Our program provides the basic skills to start a very promising

career. The degree will help them secure the jobs they're seeking. There are so many opportunities in the food service industry in areas like purchasing, food sales, kitchen design, food styling, institutional cooking."

Panichella says the new cafeteria—in which the employee dining room is called Panichella's—is a well-designed production, serving and teaching facility with the modern equipment our graduates will be using in the industry. One special device is a Combi-Therm Oven, a convection oven that also cooks with steam. "It's the way a lot of kitchen equipment is heading. It can roast, bake, and introduce steam into the baking process," says Panichella. The device can steam vegetable and roast meat at the same time, and 50 percent faster than a standard oven.

Tip-off for the women's game is 5:30 p.m. CJC's 2001 Homecoming Queen and Mr. Chipola will be crowned at halftime of the men's game which begins at 7:30 p.m.

The Indians improved to 20-5 and moved into a tie for second place with an 83-79 win over Okaloosa Walton on Feb. 7. Michael Wilder led the Indians with 30 points. Lavelle Felton had 22 and Janerio Spurlock added 14. Head coach Ryan Cross says, "The OW game was a huge win for us. It was a game we really needed to win. Our kids really responded well."

The men's conference is shaping up to be a four-team battle for the top two spots. TCC is 6-1, following a 14-point loss to OW. Chipola and OW are tied at 4-3. PJC is 4-4. GCCC is 0-8. Kedrick Brown, OW's top scorer, is out indefinitely. TCC is without Bronsky Dockery, their second leading scorer, who is recovering from ligament surgery.

Chipola baseball off to great start

The Chipola baseball team jumped out to a 6-0 record as of Feb. 8.

The Indians host Mississippi Gulf Coast on Saturday, Feb. 17 at 3 p.m. Chipola was scheduled to host the Chipola Classic over the weekend, Feb. 9-11. CJC was to play Jeff Davis at 1 p.m. on Feb. 9, Polk CC on Feb. 10 at Noon, and Middle Georgia on Feb. 11 at 3 p.m.

Chipola has road games at Darton, Feb. 13; at Central Alabama, Feb. 14; and a makeup double-header at South Georgia, Feb. 16.

Chipola head coach Jeff Johnson says, "We're happy to be 6-0. We've got a lot of our top players out with injuries, but I think this is helping us establish some depth in our program, and giving some new guys a chance to see some action."

On Feb. 6, Chipola swept Wallace at home. Chipola won game one, 5-4. Leading hitter was Scott Wearne who was one for two, with two RBI's. Ivan Naccarata was three for four. Troy Fry struck out four batters in 3 and 1/3 innings and gave up four runs. Justin Beck (1-0) picked up his first win with one strikeout in two and 2/3 innings. Jose Bautista earned the save, striking out two in the seventh.

The Indians beat Wallace 5-3 in game two on Feb. 6. Josh Place was two for three with two

The top two teams in the men's conference earn a spot in the state tournament, March 7-10 at Chipola.

The Lady Indians suffered an 89-79 loss to OW on Feb. 7. Leading scorer for Chipola was Tameka Barnes with 16, and Sowoy Varney with 13. The Lady Indians beat Pensacola on Feb. 3, 70-65. Leading scorers for CJC were Temecca Barnes with 17, Takesha Oden with 15 and Sowoy Varney with 11.

At 4-5 and 13-11 overall, Chipola is still in the hunt for a berth to the state tourney. The top three teams from the women's conference will make it to state. GCCC is 8-0. OW is 7-3. TCC is 5-3. CJC is 4-5. PJC is 2-6. NFL is 0-9. Head coach Jason Keene says, "We're looking good. We've got Pensacola, TCC at home and NFL on the road. We'll have to steal one on the road to make it to the tourney. I'd say, right now, we control our destiny."

Chipola hosts Tallahassee on Monday, Feb. 26 for **Holmes and Washington Counties Appreciation Night**. CJC president Dr. Dale O'Daniel invites all residents of both counties to attend the games free of charge. The women's game begins at 5:30. The men play at 7:30.

RBI's. Russell Martin had a two-run single. Scott Wearne hit two for two in the ninth. Jason McIntyre pitched one inning. Marianna native Matt Grimsley gave up no runs and no walks, and struck out one in four innings. Johnnie Lynch picked up the win in the last inning.

Chipola whipped Wallace 7-3 in the first game of a double header in Dothan on Feb. 4. Lee Poteet was 2 for 3 at the plate. Ricardo Nanita was 2-4 with 3 RBI's. Pitcher Kyle Olson allowed 3 runs, 1 earned run, 2 hits, 4 walks and threw 5 strikeouts in 3 and 1/3 innings. Chad Coffee relieved in the fourth. He allowed no runs, no earned runs and pitched 3 strikeouts.

In game two on Feb. 4, Chipola blanked Wallace 6-0. Ivan Naccarata was 2 for 3 at the plate. Lee Poteet was 2 for 4. Jonathon Swearingen was 1 for 3 with 2 RBI's. Sam Taulli pitched 4 innings, allowing 5 hits, two walks, no runs, and throwing 2 strikeouts. Matt Grimsley pitched one inning, allowing one hit and striking out one. Jason McIntyre pitched one strikeout in one inning. The game was called in the seventh because of darkness.

Chipola swept Darton 16-3 and 8-7 on Feb. 3 at home.

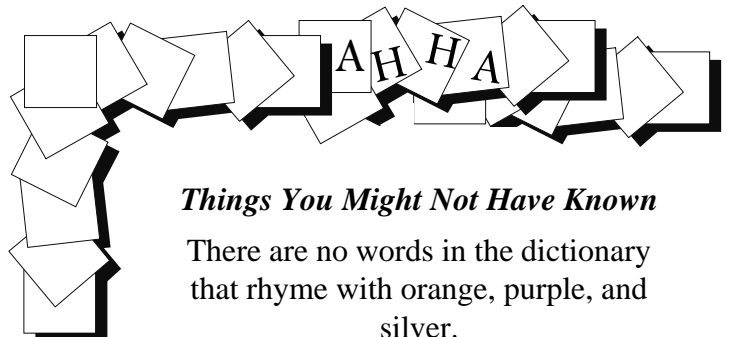
New Parking Rules
