MEANS OF ACCOMPLISHING STUDENT LEARNING OUTCOMES:

The instructor will introduce students to the design process as it relates to the theatre via a combination of lectures, videos, reading assignments, collaboration, out-of-class assignments and practicum. In addition to classroom time, there will be production hours required outside of class. Each student will be expected to read all assigned material as well as complete all assignments. The instructor will provide timely feedback on assignments and hold weekly office hours to address further questions and student needs outside of class time. The final grade will be based on class participation, exams and quizzes, practical assessments and a cumulative final exam.

Students are expected to:

- Arrive to class on time
- Turn in assignments on time
- Participate in discussions and be focused in class

- Read all assigned readings of text, plays and outside sources
- Complete all written assignments, quizzes, practical assessments and final exam
- Participate on a technical crew for a Chipola College production
- Attend one theatrical production produced by an organization other than Chipola College

Make-up work is the responsibility of the student, as covered in the instructor's First Day Handout.
