President's Message



As the 2020-21 college year comes to a close, this report highlights a successful return from the pandemic to more on-campus coul activities, and events. Our students continue to graduate in record numbers each year. This year, our fall 2020 to fall 2021 retention record numbers each year. for first-time-in-college students increased nine percentage points.

We are also celebrating the growth of opportunities at Chipola. Chipola offered more than 40 programs including 10 bachelor's degre Our curriculum has continued to grow over the past four years as we have added five new programs: AS degree in Emergency Medi-Services, AS degree in Theatre and Entertainment Technology, AS degree in Cyber Security, Certificate in Advanced Manufacturing ar Production Technology, and a Certificate in Building Construction Technologies.

The quality of Associate in Arts, Associate in Science and Workforce programs is affirmed by a variety of student success measures included in ${\sf N}$ in this report. Among them are national and state awards and recognitions. Chipola was selected by the Aspen Institute as one of 150 top community colleges in America for students performing at a high level. Our seventh consecutive nomination for the 2023 prize means other colleges across the nation will review our college best practices for student success. Best Colleges ranked Chi among the Top 10 Accredited Colleges in Florida in 2020 and UniversityHQ ranked Chipola #4 in Best Associate Degree Colleges in Florida and #8 in the Top 50 Colleges for being the most affordable in 2021. Our Board has not raised tuition in the last decade.

Our student organizations and teams continue to win State and National awards. The Chipola Brain Bowl team finished second as the State Runner-up. Two Chipola students are members of the 130 student All-Florida Academic Team and recognized for National PTK honors. Two Phi Beta Lambda students finished in first place in two competitions in the State. Four Chipola Theatre students have been named to the 2020-21 Florida College System Alf-Academic Team in Theatre. The Men's Basketball team won the State Championship, and the Chipola Lady Indians won their State Championship. The softball team made their sixth consecutive appearance at the National Tournament and were co-champions at the Panhandle Conference, winning the State Championship.

Our faculty, staff and administrators work every day to ensure that our students receive the very best education and support services. To help students make informed decisions about career paths this year, Chipola opened a campus fully-staffed Career Center and developed a course designed for career exploration. Chipola provide a solid foundation for our students as they transfer into our baccalaureate degrees, go to universities or move into their chosen caree

Chipola is proud of our many graduates and their accomplishments. Florida Supreme Court Justice Ricky Polston is the 2021 Chipola Alumnus of the Year. He received the State Lifetime Achievement Award in the Association of Florida Colleges LeRoy Collins Alumni program. Former Chipola Baseball player, Adam Duvall, helped the Braves to a 7-0 win to capture the 2021 World Series title.



Enrollment of Prior-Year Public HS Graduates from College District







The Aspen Institute Names Chipola College One of 150 U.S. Community Colleges Eligible for 2023 Aspen Prize

MARIANNA—The Aspen Institute named Chipola College one of the 150 institutions eligible to compete for the \$1 million Aspen Prize for Community College Excellence, the nation's signature recognition of achievement among America's community colleges. This is Chipola's seventh consecutive nomination for this honor. Chipola stands out among more than 1,000 community colleges nationwide as having high and improving levels of student success as well as equitable outcomes for Black and Hispanic students and those from lower-income backgrounds.

Chipola was one of only 14 Florida Colleges nominated for the Award. The Florida list includes: Broward, Chipola College, College of Central Florida, Daytona, Eastern Florida State, Florida Gateway, Florida State College at Jacksonville, Gulf Coast, North

Florida, Palm Beach State, Saint Johns River, Seminole, South Florida and Tallahassee.

Chipola President Dr. Sarah Clemmons, says, "We are proud to be counted among the top 150 community colleges in the U.S. Our seventh consecutive nomination for the Aspen Prize confirms that our students are performing at a high level. This nomination also affirms that our faculty and staff are providing a strong academic program which prepares students to succeed."

The 150 eligible colleges have been invited to submit data and narratives as the next steps in an intensive data and practice review process, culminating in the announcement of the Prize winner in spring 2023.

Eligible colleges must show strong and improving student outcomes in key areas such as retention, completion, transfer, and equity. Nationwide—only 150 of the approximately 1,000 public two-year colleges nationwide assessed for the Prize have been invited to apply—the full list can be accessed on the Prize homepage.

Chipola Students Recognized for State And National Awards

Chipola College recognized two of its top students, Bailey Rich and Parker Hooper, at a press conference on April 21.

The two Chipola sophomores were among 137 students named to the All-Florida Academic Team from the nearly 1 million students in the Florida College System. Rich also was named a Coca-Cola Silver Scholar. His portrait will hang on the Chipola College Academic Wall of Honor for winning the national award.

Bailey Rich of Bonifay, is the son of Dwight and Heather Rich. He is an Exercise Physiology major who plans to transfer to Florida State University. He graduated in 2019 from Holmes County High School where he was involved in Fellowship of Christian Athletes, Key Club, Beta and Future Business Leaders of America as well as lettering in Football and Basketball.

At Chipola, Rich is a member of the Honors Program, Science Club, and Mu Alpha Theta. He also is President of Phi Theta Kappa and Pre-Med Society along with being a tutor in the Academic Center for Excellence (ACE) and a student assistant for Chipola's Men's Basketball team.

Through PTK, he organized a food drive for children in Africa, and developed a campaign known as COVID Caring which provided handwritten letters to residents in nursing homes.

Parker Hooper of Bonifay, is the son of Ernie and Sherri Hooper. He is an Exercise Physiology major who plans to transfer to the Florida State

University. He graduated in 2019 from Holmes County High School where he was involved in baseball, golf, Key club and BETA.

At Chipola, Hooper is a member of the Honors Program, Science Club, Mu Alpha Theta, Phi Theta Kappa, and is a tutor in the Academic Center for Excellence (ACE).

Through PTK, he has organized book drive for students in Africa. He also established "Chem for Kids" where he performed science experiments at local elementary schools.

Phi Theta Kappa is the premier honor society recognizing the academic achievement of students at associate degree-granting colleges and helping them to grow as scholars and leaders. Chipola Awarded \$1.7 Million for Welding and Construction

Chipola College held a press conference April 28 to announce the award of a \$1.7 million grant to support the college's welding and building construction programs. The grant funds will be used to expand the programs to support Hurricane Michael recovery efforts pertaining to residential and commercial construction.

Funds for the grant are part of the Rebuild Florida Workforce Recovery Training Program: Hurricane Michael project, administered by the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development and the Florida Department of Economic Opportunity.

Chipola President Dr. Sarah Clemmons, says, "We are proud to be a part of Rebuild Florida's Workforce Recovery Training efforts. Our new Building Construction program is helping to train workers to rebuild homes and businesses devastated by the hurricane. Our first class also has partnered with Habitat for Humanity to build homes for local families. Our welding program is providing highly-skilled workers for good-paying jobs in the area."

The Florida Department of Economic Opportunity's Office of Long-Term Resiliency supports communities following disasters by addressing long-term recovery needs for housing, infrastructure and economic development. DEO is the designated state authority responsible for administering all U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) long-term recovery funds awarded to the state.

Florida has been allocated funds to support long-term disaster recovery through the Community Development Block Grant - Disaster Recovery Program (CDBG-DR). CDBG-DR is designed to address housing, infrastructure and economic development needs.

CareerSource Chipola will provide support and assistance to students who need additional help.

Chipola's Building Construction Technology program, led by instructor Scott Phelps, prepares students for employment or advanced training. The 1,050 clock hour program covers electrical, plumbing, heating/ventilation/air-conditioning, masonry, carpentry, and the use of hand and power tools. Students also will work with math and construction

drawings of floor systems, walls, ceilings and roofing. Students are exposed to all the steps in a building process, and are exposed to entrepreneurship skills for those who want to start their own businesses.

The high demand for construction jobs is expected to continue in the area well into the future. Students in Building Construction can move into the workforce or continue their education in Chipola's Two-Year AS Degree in Civil Engineering Technology.

The Chipola Welding program utilizes state-of-the-art welding equipment, mobile welding units, and simulation technologies. Workforce Florida projects annual growth of 13,500 jobs in advanced manufacturing and construction, with 75% requiring postsecondary training. Better than average annual growth is predicted for the welding trades.

Students interested in the construction and welding trades may be eligible to receive state or federal financial aid or scholarships for these programs.

Institutional Highlights

- In academic year 2020-21, Chipola's Financial Aid Office administered nearly more than \$2.7 million in federal financial aid that helped 983 students attend Chipola College.
- When asked what factors influenced them to attend Chipola College, 2020-21 entering freshmen gave the highest ratings to the following: campus location, cost, scholarship availability, and financial aid availability.
- The average scores of Chipola's students on the Community College Survey on Student Engagement (CCSSE) exceeded those of the national student cohort in four of five areas of student engagement.
- Twenty-nine percent of Chipola's graduates in 2018-19 were of minority race a figure that reflects area's demographics.
- The latest data show that Chipola College enrolled 26% of students who graduated from district high schools the previous year; this compares to 22% statewide for colleges and their district high schools.
- The fall 2020 to fall 2021 retention rate for first-time-in-college students was 71% a nine percentage point increase from the previous academic year.
- There was an average deviation of eight percentage points from the mean fall 2020 to fall 2021 retention rate among Chipola students when grouped by race/ethnicity.
- The fall 2020 to fall 2021 retention rate was 58% for female students and was 53% for male students.
- The 100% normal time graduation rate (e.g., graduating in two years from enrollment) for degree-seeking African American students increased by 23 percentage points over the most recent three-year reporting period; the increase was 25 percentage points for those who completed in 150% of normal time.



- Chipola enrolled 43 students who self-reported disabilities during the 2018-19 academic year.
- The latest data show that 12% of students in career and workforce development programs were enrolled in programs nontraditional for their gender. The data also show that the completion rate for students in programs nontraditional for their gender increased by 16.2 percentage points from the previous year.
- Ninety-seven percent of Student Support Services program participants were in good academic standing during the academic year.
- Chipola's Student Support Services program exceeded all of its target levels of performance for academic year 2020-21.



- For the second year in a row, Chipola's Take Stock in Children program received additional funding for achieving a gold performance rating.
- Forty percent of Chipola's students received financial assistance through the Chipola College Foundation.
- The Academic Center for Excellence (ACE) served 798 students during the academic year.
- On the entering student survey, respondents indicated high levels of satisfaction with academic advising.
- Respondents to the graduating student survey assigned a mean satisfaction rating of 4.28 to "quality of online courses" (5=very satisfied, 1=very dissatisfied).
- Chipola's Testing Center administered 1781 tests (e.g., online tests, CLEP, ACT, ETS Proficiency Profiles) to students during the academic year.
- The Chipola College Library held more than 64,000 e-books compared to an average of 29,738 for similarly-situated area colleges.
- The Chipola Library received a mean satisfaction rating of 4.52 from graduating students (5 = very satisfied, 1 = very dissatisfied).
- Assessment results show that students who transfer from Chipola College to State University System institutions perform as well or better than students who transfer from other Florida College System institutions.
- On the Community College Survey of Student Engagement (CCSSE), students rated their experience at Chipola College higher than did their counterparts in the national cohort in many areas, including contributions to their ability to write and speak clearly and effectively and solve numerical problems.
- When asked on the graduation student survey to indicate the extent to which their experience at Chipola helped them to acquire college-level general education competencies, the highest ratings ("much" or "very much") were given to the following competencies:
 - o Evaluate societal and ethical, problems, and values (mean of 4.00 on a 5-point scale)
 - o Interpret, evaluate, and appreciate works of human culture (mean of 4.12 on a 5-point scale)
 - o Demonstrate basic mathematical skills and knowledge (mean of 4.26 on a 5-point scale)
 - o Comprehend and articulate effectively in English by reading, writing, and oral communication (mean of 4.25 on a 5-point scale)
 - o Explore the nature of science (4.11 on a 5-point scale)
- The 2020-21 pass rate (all attempts) on licensure exams were: EMT 85%; CNA 100%, correctional officer 100%; law enforcement officer 100%; firefighter 92%; cosmetology 92%, Florida teacher certification professional knowledge and subject area exams 92%,
- When asked to indicate the degree to which Chipola provides support needed to succeed in college, 79% of students responded "quite a bit" or "very much" on the Community College Survey of Student Engagement (CCSSE).
- The success rates for Chipola's program completers in reporting year 2020 were: 100% in BS programs, 89% in the AA degree program, 89% in AS programs, and 80% in PSAV programs. (Success = graduated, enrolled in good standing, or left in good standing).
- More than 200 students earned state-fundable industry certifications during the academic year.
- Chipola College offered students opportunities to earn industry certifications/ licensures in 29 occupational programs during the academic year.



- When asked to indicate the extent to which their experience at Chipola College helped them to attain general skills and competencies, 2020-21 graduates gave the highest ratings ("much" or "very much") to the following:
 - o Continue your education (mean of 4.47 on a 5-point scale)
 - o Establish an education pathway toward a career (mean of 4.40 on a 5-point scale)
 - o Solve problems (mean of 4.40 on a 5-point scale)
 - o Enter employment or advance in employment (mean of 4.37 on a 5-point scale)
 - o Establish career goals (mean of 4.34 on a 5-point scale)
 - o Make informed decisions about career goals (mean of 4.34 on a 5-point scale)
- The fall 2020 to fall 2021 retention rate of degree-seeking students who entered Chipola College with dual enrollment credits earned off campus was 62%. This compared to 58% for students who entered with no dual enrollment credits.
- In their annual survey, 90% of Chipola employees "agreed" or "strongly agreed" that Chipola College is a good place to work.
- Graduating student survey respondents indicated they were "satisfied" or "very satisfied" with campus safety (mean of 4.48 on a 5-point scale).

• Chipola's proportional expenditures of its Fund 1 operating funds for 2018-19 were: 70% for personnel, 23% for current expenses, and 7% for capital outlay.


- Chipola's occupational program offerings aligned with regional occupational demand projections, which demonstrated the college's support for economic and community development.
- In their annual survey, Chipola employees "agreed" or "strongly agreed" (mean of 4.45 on a 5-point scale) that the college's cultural events enhance the quality of life in the region.
- 86% of graduating students reported they were "satisfied" or "very satisfied" with the quality of teaching at Chipola College.
- Graduating students reported they were "satisfied" or "very satisfied" with the quality of academic advising provided by college advisors (mean of 4.34 on a 5-point scale).
- Graduating students reported they were "satisfied" or "very satisfied" with library services provided by the college (mean of 4.52 on 5-point scale).
- Graduating students reported they were "satisfied" or "very satisfied" with Chipola's Academic Center for Excellence (mean of 4.56 on a 5-point scale).
- Graduating students reported they were "satisfied" or "very satisfied" with their overall educational experience at Chipola College (mean of 4.47 on a 5-point scale).
- On the Community College Survey of Student Engagement (CCSSE), 94% of Chipola students indicated they would recommend the college to a friend or family member.














Set Goals, Define Purpose, Achieve Success: Chipola's Quality Enhancement Plan

Chipola College data showed the need to help students develop skills needed to make informed decisions regarding career goals and steps to achieve those goals. Institutional data showed that students were more likely to graduate if they had identified a major before beginning their second semester of enrollment. After analyzing data and reviewing feedback from constituencies and best practices of other colleges, Chipola College identified the goal of its Quality Enhancement Plan (QEP): To enable students to make informed decisions regarding their career goals and related educational pathways.

To achieve the QEP goal, faculty and staff representatives developed a two-credit hour course, SLS 1401, Career and Life Planning, that first-time-in-college, degree-seeking students take during their initial semester of enrollment. Through self-assessments and career exploratory assignments, students: (1) assess their personal skills, interests, and values related to career options; (2) research the viability of career opportunities related to the results of their self-assessments; (3) establish career goals and; (4) formulate personal educational plans related to their career goals.

The SLS 1401 course was piloted in the 2018 spring semester and fully implemented in the 2018 fall semester. Following each semester, college leadership analyzed course outcome data and student feedback received during focus group sessions. Based on the data and student feedback, an assessment was made of the current QEP and the SLS 1401 course, and the following changes for improvement have been implemented: 1.) Reduce SLS 1401 course hours from 2 to 1 semester hour; 2.) Revisit scheduling and alignment with SLS 1101 orientation; 3.) Eliminate certain response options from the end-of-course survey; 4.) Revise SLO4; and 5) Advise entering degree-seeking students to enroll in SLS 1401 their first semester of enrollment.

Foundation

- College officials hosted a Dedication Ceremony for the Kay Sellers Trammell Foundation Building on Nov. 10, 2021. A portrait of the late Trammell will hang in the foyer of the Foundation house.
- In Fall 2020, the Chipola Foundation offered the First Generation scholarship to provide opportunities for students who were first in their family to attend college.

Resources

- The Chipola Foundation awarded 1,013 scholarships totaling \$720,700 during the 2020-21 year, which includes: Summer II 2020, Fall 2020, Spring 2021 and Summer 1 2021. Foundation assets as of June 30, 2021 were \$24,681,825.
- The Foundation awarded 1,098 scholarships totaling \$778,708 in 2019-20. .
- In June 2020, the college received \$221,717 in Performance-Based Incentive Industry Certifications for 2019-20 for 223 fundable industry certifications.
- The Foundation received \$113,462 from the William W. and Loretta C. Richardson Scholarship Foundation for scholarships in Nursing, EMT, and Paramedic.
- The 2020 Quail Calcutta raised \$46,500 for scholarships.
- The US Department of Education awarded a federal Student Support Services (SSS) grant of \$1.3 million to help students succeed in college.
- A \$1.7 Million grant from the Department of Economic Opportunity (DEO) was awarded for the Building Construction and Welding programs. Funds came from a Community Development Block Grant-Disaster Recovery (CDBG-DR) and the Rebuild Florida Workforce Recovery Training Program.
- In July 2021, Gov. Ron DeSantis and FCS Chancellor Kathy Hebda delivered a \$354,879 DEO Florida Job Growth grant.

Students Highlights

- Four Chipola graduates were accepted into the 2020-21 FSU College of Medicine. They were: Tripp Taylor, Max Harrell, Ann Marie Brown and Jayde Smelcer. Jenny Snowden was accepted to FSU's Physician's Assistant program. All five were members of the Chipola's Honors program and Pre-Med Society.
- Students in the Automotive Technology achieved a 100% pass rate on the ASE Automotive Service Excellence national exam in the Fall 2020 term. All students passed the ASE electrical exam. One dual-enrollment student, Justin Tye, scored 48 out of a possible 50.
- Phi Theta Kappa students collected school supplies for Louisiana schools impacted by Hurricane Ida.
- A total of 35 Chipola student athletes and 9 theatre and music students were recognized for having a minimum 3.30 GPA during the 2019-20 academic year.
- Students in the Construction Technology and Welding programs assisted TV host and Chipola alumnus Danny Lipford in the construction of Lafayette Landing Pocket Park in Marianna.
- The Chipola Chapter of the Association of Florida Colleges awarded five scholarships to dependents of college employees in 2021. Recipients are: Thomas Schaefer II, Taylor Young, Lucinda Clark-Hussey, Chelsea Gardner and Addi O'Bryan. Since 1993, AFC has awarded over \$175,000 in scholarships through concession sales.



- In a collaboration between the School of Education, Literature/Language, and Business and Technology, students printed 3D "Alas, poor Yorick" skulls for Professor Kurt McInnis' Shakespeare for English Educators course.
- Students Parker Hooper and Bailey Rich, were named to the 2021 All-Florida Academic Team.
- The Chipola Brain Bowl team competed at the National tournament, finishing fifth. Chipola finished second at the FCSAA State Championship. Chipola has been in the State championship game 11 times, winning 9 State titles. All four players placed among the top 20 in individual scoring.
- Students in the Building Construction Technology program partnered with the Auburn University Rural Studio to build four Habitat for Humanity homes in Marianna.
- At the 2021 Phi Beta Lambda State Conference, Sandra Diane Watson won 1st place in Job Interview and Lela Abbott won 1st place in Client Service.
- In June 2021, the School of Education held their first Annual Aspiring Educator Senior Signing event. Four incoming Chipola students signed commitments to become teachers.
- Chipola hosted a Diabetes Awareness Program with the Jackson County Health Department and the Black Student Union.

- Henry Mack, Chancellor for Career, Technical and Adult Education in the Florida College System toured the College's career and technical programs in February of 2021 for Career and Technical Education Month.
- Some 70 students from 11 area high schools competed in the 31st Annual Throssell Literature/Language Festival. The event was held virtually. Festival Coordinator Dr. Rachel West delivered trophies to the schools.

- The college hosted a 2021 Legislative Delegation Meeting with Rep. Brad Drake and Sen. George Gainer.
- The 2021 Chipola Graduation was held live in the Prough Center for the Arts. Commencement speaker was Henry Mack, FCS Chancellor of Career, Technical and Adult Education. Only graduates attended, but the event was live-streamed for family and friends.

- The Literature/Language Department hosted its second Annual Chipola Poetry Café. Students and alumni presented original poetry, along with guest speaker, Shaun O. Smith, co-curator of the Grass Routes Poetry Society.
- The college partnered with BBB Industries to create and host 10 automotive technology tip videos. BBB Industries is recognized as the aftermarket leader of innovative products and services, and has donated auto parts to the Chipola Automotive program.
