# President's Message



This report of the 2021-22 academic year highlights our focus on advancing students and moving our college forward. While we're seeing more on-campus courses, activities, and events, we continue to strive to meet the needs of our communities and our district. We are improving our online options as well as increasing dual enrollment opportunities. Our students continue to graduate in record numbers each year. Our success rate of AA & AS students continues to be significantly higher than other colleges in the Florida College System.

The quality of our programs is affirmed by a variety of student success measures included in this report. Among them are national and state awards and recognitions. Chipola was selected by the Aspen Institute as one of only 150 top community colleges for the seventh consecutive nomination for the 2023 Aspen prize. Best Colleges ranked Chipola among the Top-10 Accredited Colleges in Florida in 2020 and University HQ ranked Chipola #4 in Best Associate Degree Colleges in Florida and #8 in the Top 50 Colleges for being the most affordable in the nation in 2021.

Our student organizations and teams continue to win state and national awards. The Chipola Brain Bowl team won the FCSAA State Championship, and two Brain Bowl members were named to the All-Tournament Team. Two top students were named to the Phi Theta Kappa All-Florida Academic Team and one was a Wall of Honor inductee. Phi Beta Lambda students won five top-10 awards at the PBL National Leadership Conference, and won 14 top-four awards at the PBL 2022 State Leadership Conference. Two Chipola Theatre students were named Academic Division Students of the Month for 2021-22. Additionally, the Theatre Department earned a "superior" rating for the fall theatre production of *Hands on a Hardbody* and a "superior" rating and Innovation Award for the spring production of *The Importance of Being Earnest*.

In athletics, the Men's Basketball team won the state championship, and Coach Donnie Tyndall was named Coach of the Year. The Lady Indians advanced as an at-large participant in the NJCAA National Tournament but were eliminated in the opening game. Director of Athletics and Head Baseball Coach, Jeff Johnson, was named Florida Panhandle Coach of the Year and inducted into the NJCAA Baseball Coaches Association Hall of Fame. So many of our student athletes were named to All-State and All-Region lists, more can be seen about them on pages 16-17, but most importantly, we recognize their successes in the classroom.

Our faculty, staff and administrators work every day to ensure that our students receive the very best education and support services. To help students make informed decisions about career paths this year, Chipola opened a fully-staffed campus Career Center and developed a course designed for career exploration. Chipola opened a new Patient Simulation Center for Health Science students in the Fall of 2021 to provide a solid foundation in program clinical skills.

Chipola College was awarded \$6,658,392.77 in grant funds during academic year 2021-22. We are grateful for these funds as they help us continue with our mission of doing the best and being the best for our students and for our community. I have continued to promote economic development in our area by serving on Florida's Great Northwest Executive Board, Jackson Hospital's Board of Trustees and Foundation Board, Florida's CareerSource local board, and district Chambers of Commerce. These organizations support our district's workforce.

As we wrap up 2022, we look forward with excitement to our 75th Anniversary of Chipola College. We have so much to celebrate and be proud of as we continue *Changing Lives and Creating Futures*!







#### Fall 2021 Enrollment by Academic Award









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# Chipola's Dual Enrollment Summer Academy Is A Success

Students met for 6 weeks, Monday through Thursday while gaining a head start on their college education at zero cost. Students were presented with a Chipola College T-shirt on their final day.

# **Chipola Students Recognized for State And National Awards**

Chipola College recognized two of its top students, Cheyenne Glass and Jenna Gilmore, at a press conference on April 19, 2021. These two Chipola sophomores were among 137 students named to the All-Florida Academic Team from the nearly one million students in the Florida College System.

**Cheyenne Glass** of Bonifay is a Dental Hygiene major who plans to transfer to Tallahassee Community College. Through PTK, she organized the "Thrifting for Tanzania" project, where she collected clothes and household items from students on campus to donate to the Holmes County Ministerial Association Thrift Store. Miss Glass was also named to the All-USA Academic team and her portrait will be added to the Chipola College Academic Wall of Honor.

Jenna Gilmore of Chipley is an Engineering major who will graduate with her Associate in Arts degree in May of 2022. Through PTK, Gilmore organized a supply drive to send to the victims of Hurricane Ida. She gathered 14 boxes of supplies to send to a local school that distributed the supplies to affected neighborhoods.

Phi Theta Kappa is the premier honor society recognizing the academic achievement of students at associate degree-granting colleges and helping them to grow as scholars and leaders. The Society is made up of more than 3.5 million members and nearly 1,300 chapters in 10 nations.

# **Chipola PBL Wins Big at State & National Conferences**

The Chipola College chapter of Phi Beta Lambda brought home 14 top-four awards from the PBL 2022 State Leadership Conference in Orlando, FL, March 17-20. Seven students attended business sessions, workshops and team building events. These students competed

and brought home 14 top-four awards, six first-place awards, two second-place awards, two third-place and four-fourth place awards.

#### Winners are Christopher Brockington, Melanie Canada, Angelina Hereld, Ashley Lytle, Chad Mayo, Cullan Murray and Jeremy Thomason.

Chipola Phi Beta Lambda students went on to the PBL National Leadership Conference, June 24-27, in Chicago, Illinois, and brought home five top-10 national awards.

More than 1,000 of America's best and brightest college students traveled to Chicago to compete for an honored spot on stage among the top 10 and a share of more than \$95,000 in cash awards. Chipola winners at the national level include: Ashley Lytle, Chad Mayo, Cullan Murray, Christopher Brockington.

Chipola faculty adviser, Glenda Bethel, says, "The group was diverse, and I was impressed with how well they worked together. They represented Chipola College well and were excited about this experience."



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# Chipola Named Among Most Affordable by University HQ

University HQ ranked Chipola number five on a list of Most Affordable Business Management Colleges and number eight on the list of Most Affordable Colleges.

Chipola President, Dr. Sarah Clemmons, says, "We believe Chipola is an exceptional value in higher education. These rankings affirm that we are providing affordable access to quality learning opportunities."



University HQ is a leading independent education organization that provides students with resources to prepare and plan their career paths in their chosen fields. University HQ provides information on colleges, entrance requirements, and career paths. The organization also provides career guides to help students navigate requirements to gain entry to programs, become certified, or move up the career ladder.

Chipola's University HQ rankings are the latest in a list of recent honors, including two BestColleges.com rankings (Third in Best Online Colleges with Open Admissions, Ninth in Best Accredited Colleges in Florida) and seven consecutive nominations for the prestigious Aspen Prize (2023, 2021, 2019, 2017, 2015, 2013, 2011). Chipola also was named one of the top colleges in the Florida College System in 2018 and 2017, earning a gold ranking in the state's Performance Funding Model program.

## Chipola Brain Bowl Wins FCSAA State Championship

The Chipola Brain Bowl team won the 2022 FCSAA State Championship. Chipola defeated their long-time rival Valencia College 600-275 in the championship match to claim the title. **Taylor Young** and **Taylor Munroe** led the assault in the championship game with 17 total tossups, with Taylor Young nailing ten tossups, and Taylor Munroe landing seven tossups. **Jon Proctor** and **Jack Connolly** also had strong contributions by adding six more tossups between the two of them.



Taylor Young finished as a tournament all-star by placing second overall in individual scoring. Taylor Munroe was one spot out of being a tournament all-star by placing sixth in overall scoring.

The Chipola team swept the tournament, winning all nine of the round-robin games along with the win in the championship game. The team averaged 464.5 points per game, allowing its opponents only 109.5 points per game average. Valencia was second in points per game with 343.5.

The team of **Taylor Young, Taylor Munroe, Jon Proctor, Jack Connolly,** and **Kaleb Todd** became the tenth Chipola team to win a state championship. Chipola leads all Florida Community Colleges with ten championships. Chipola's Brain Bowl Team is coached by Mr. Stan Young.

## Set Goals, Define Purpose, Achieve Success: Chipola's Quality Enhancement Plan

Chipola College data showed the need to help students develop skills needed to make informed decisions regarding career goals and steps to achieve those goals. Institutional data showed that students were more likely to graduate if they had identified a major before beginning their second semester of enrollment. After analyzing data and reviewing feedback from constituencies and best practices of other colleges, Chipola College identified the goal of its Quality Enhancement Plan (QEP): To enable students to make informed decisions regarding their career goals and related educational pathways.

To achieve the QEP goal, faculty and staff representatives developed a two-credit hour course, SLS 1401, Career and Life Planning, that first-time-in-college, degree-seeking students take during their initial semester of enrollment. Through self-assessments and career exploratory assignments, students: (1) assess their personal skills, interests, and values related to career options; (2) research the viability of career opportunities related to the results of their self-assessments; (3) establish career goals and; (4) formulate personal educational plans related to their career goals.

The SLS 1401 course was piloted in the 2018 spring semester and fully implemented in the 2018 fall semester. Following each semester, college leadership analyzed course outcome data and student feedback received during focus group sessions. Based on the data and student feedback, an assessment was made of the current QEP and the SLS 1401 course, and the following changes for improvement have been implemented: 1.) Reduce SLS 1401 course hours from two to one semester hour; 2.) Revisit scheduling and alignment with SLS 1101, Orientation; 3.) Eliminate certain response options from the end-of-course survey; 4.) Revise student learning outcome four; and 5) Advise entering degree-seeking students to enroll in SLS 1401 their first semester of enrollment.

# Changing Lives and Creating Futures Institutional Highlights

- In 2021-22, Chipola's Financial Aid Office administered nearly more than \$2.6 million in federal financial aid that helped 853 students attend Chipola College.
- When asked what factors influenced them to attend Chipola College, 2021-22 entering freshmen gave the highest ratings to the following: campus location, reputation of college, cost, scholarship availability, availability of courses in major, and financial aid availability.
- The average scores of Chipola's students on the Community College Survey on Student Engagement (CCSSE) exceeded those of the national student cohort in all five areas of student engagement.
- Twenty-nine percent of Chipola's graduates in 2021-22 were of minority race a figure that reflects area's demographics.
- The latest data show that Chipola College enrolled 26% of students who graduated from district high schools the previous year; this compares to 22% statewide for colleges and their district high schools.
- The fall 2020 to fall 2021 retention rate for first-time-in-college students was 71% a nine percentage point increase from the previous academic year.
- The fall 2020 to fall 2021 retention rate of degree-seeking students who entered Chipola College with dual enrollment credits earned off campus was 62%. This compared to 58% for students who entered with no dual enrollment credits.
- There was an average deviation of eight percentage points from the mean fall 2020 to fall 2021 retention rate among Chipola students when grouped by race/ethnic.
- The fall 2020 to fall 2021 retention rate was 58% for female students and 53% for male students.
- The 100% normal time graduation rate (e.g., graduating in two years from enrollment) for degree-seeking African American students increased by 23 percentage points over the most recent three-year reporting period; the increase was 25 percentage points for those who completed in 150% of normal time.
- Chipola enrolled 39 students who self-reported disabilities during the 2021-22 academic year.
- The latest data show that 12% of students in career and workforce development programs were enrolled in programs nontraditional for their gender. The data also show that the completion rate for students in programs nontraditional for their gender increased by 16.2 percentage points from the previous year.
- Ninety-seven percent of Student Support Services program participants were in good academic standing during the academic year.



- Chipola's Student Support Services program exceeded all of its target levels of performance for academic year 2021-22.
- For the third year in a row, Chipola's Take Stock in Children program received additional funding for achieving a gold performance rating.
- Forty percent of Chipola's students received financial assistance through the Chipola College Foundation.
- The Academic Center for Excellence (ACE) served 956 students during the academic year.
- On the entering student survey, respondents indicated high levels of satisfaction with academic advising.
- Respondents to the graduating student survey assigned a mean satisfaction rating of 4.21 to "quality of online courses" (5=very satisfied, 1=very dissatisfied).
- Chipola's Testing Center administered 1982 tests (e.g., online tests, CLEP, ACT, ETS Proficiency Profiles) to students during the academic year.
- The Chipola College Library held more than 64,000 e-books compared to an average of 29,738 for similarly-situated area colleges.
- The Chipola library received a mean satisfaction rating of 4.52 from graduating students (5 = very satisfied, 1 = very dissatisfied).
- Assessment results show that students who transfer from Chipola College to State University System institutions perform as well or better than students who transfer from other Florida College System institutions.
- On the Community College Survey of Student Engagement (CCSSE), students rated their experience at Chipola College higher than did their counterparts in the national cohort in contributions to their ability to write and speak clearly and to effectively solve numerical problems.
- When asked on the graduation student survey to indicate the extent to which their experience at Chipola helped them to acquire college-level general education competencies, the highest ratings ("much" or "very much") were given to the following competencies:
  - Evaluate societal and ethical, problems, and values (mean of 4.06 on a 5-point scale)
  - Interpret, evaluate, and appreciate works of human culture (mean of 4.24 on a 5-point scale)
  - Demonstrate basic mathematical skills and knowledge (mean of 4.32 on a 5-point scale)
  - Comprehend and articulate effectively in English by reading, writing, and oral communication (mean of 4.30 on a 5-point scale)
  - Explore the nature of science (mean of 4.17 on a 5-point scale)
- The pass rates (all attempts) on licensure exams were: EMT 88%; paramedic 100%; CNA 93%, RN nursing 90%, correctional officer 100%; law enforcement officer 100%; firefighter 88%; cosmetology 100%, Florida teacher certification professional knowledge 97% and subject area exams 100%,
- When asked to indicate the degree to which Chipola provides support needed to succeed in college, 79% of students responded "quite a bit" or "very much" on the Community College Survey of Student Engagement (CCSSE).
- The success rates for Chipola's program completers were: 93% in the AA degree program, 96% in AS programs, and 78% in PSAV programs. (Success = graduated, enrolled in good standing, or left in good standing).
- More than 200 students earned state-fundable industry certifications during the academic year.

- Chipola College offered students opportunities to earn industry certifications/licensures in 29
  occupational programs during the academic year.
- When asked to indicate the extent to which their experience at Chipola College helped them to attain general skills and competencies, 2021-22 graduates gave the highest ratings ("much" or "very much") to the following:
  - Continue your education (mean of 4.45 on a 5-point scale)
  - Establish an education pathway toward a career (mean of 4.39 on a 5-point scale)
  - Solve problems (mean of 4.28 on a 5-point scale)
  - Enter employment or advance in employment (mean of 4.29 on a 5-point scale)
  - Establish career goals (mean of 4.34 on a 5-point scale)
  - Make informed decisions about career goals (mean of 4.33 on a 5-point scale)
- In their annual survey, 90% of Chipola employees "agreed" or "strongly agreed" that Chipola College is a good place to work.
- Chipola's proportional expenditures of its Fund 1 operating funds for 2021-22 were: 70% for personnel, 29% for current expenses, and 1% for capital outlay.
- Chipola's occupational program offerings aligned with regional occupational demand projections, which demonstrated the college's support for economic and community development.
- In their annual survey, Chipola employees "agreed" or "strongly agreed" (mean of 4.42 on a 5-point scale) that the college's cultural events enhance the quality of life in the region.
- 83% of graduating students reported they were "satisfied" or "very satisfied" with the quality of teaching at Chipola College.
- Graduating student survey respondents indicated they were "satisfied" or "very satisfied" with campus safety (mean of 4.43 on a 5-point scale).
- Graduating students reported they were "satisfied" or "very satisfied" with the quality of academic advising provided by college advisors (mean of 4.27 on a 5-point scale).
- Graduating students reported they were "satisfied" or "very satisfied" with library services provided by the college (mean of 4.52 on a 5-point scale).
- Graduating students reported they were "satisfied" or "very satisfied" with Chipola's Academic Center for Excellence (mean of 4.49 on a 5-point scale).
- Graduating students reported they were "satisfied" or "very satisfied" with their overall educational experience at Chipola College (mean of 4.42 on a 5-point scale).
- On the Community College Survey of Student Engagement (CCSSE), 97% of Chipola students indicated they would recommend the college to a friend or family member.




