President's Message



Throughout the 2022-23 academic year, Chipola celebrated the 75th anniversary of the college. It is an honor to be a part of The Chipola College history as its 12th president, and consider with pride all WE have accomplished since Chipola began in 1947. I say "we" because Chipola's rich legacy includes all the faculty, administrators, staff, Trustees, Alumni, partners, and fans who have supported and contributed to the success of our students and our college over the years. In celebration, many first-time events for the college and community included: The 75th Anniversary Commemorative Book and Coin Reveal; The 75th Anniversary Video; Trunk or Treat Around Indian Circle; Chipola Christmas Tree Lighting; Chipola Alumni Day of Giving; Chipola Diamond Dinner fundraiser; 75 Years of Chipola Music; Chipola 5k Run; Chipola 75th Anniversary Fireworks Show; and Chipola's 75th Graduation honored Alumni and "History of the College" video.

Even while focusing on our history of success, we were recognized for our continued annual success in 2022-23. Chipola ranked well in the state of Florida and in the nation in 5 different online ranking polls. Chipola was ranked #65 in Best Colleges (in the nation)

by US News and World Report. Chipola was also ranked by EduMed.org, Niche, and UniversityHQ. Chipola was nominated for the 7th consecutive ASPEN as one of the top 150 Community Colleges in the nation in 2023. The School of Nursing accreditation has been continued through 2027 and Teacher Education accreditation until 2030. The Business & Technology Department had open house for the new Cyber Range.

We continue to grow with more on-campus courses, activities, and events in order to meet the needs of our communities and our district. We are improving our online course options as well as increasing dual enrollment opportunities with a Summer Academy for district students. Our students continue to graduate in record numbers each year. Our success rate of AA & AS students continues to be significantly higher than other colleges in the Florida College System.

Our student organizations and teams continue to win state and national awards. The Chipola Brain Bowl team won the Panhandle Conference Tournament and the FCSAA State Championship. Collegiate Future Business Leaders (FBL) students won seven top-5 awards at the FBL National Leadership Conference. Three Chipola students were named to the FCSAA All Academic Team in Music and seven students were named to the FCSAA All Academic Team in Theatre. Additionally, the Theatre Department earned a "superior" for fall theatre production and a "superior" and Community Service Award for spring production. The Natural Science department offered a new seminar series, "Science In The Parks", for students and the community.

In athletics, the Men's Basketball team won their 27th Panhandle Conference Championship and Coach Donnie Tyndall was named Coach of the Year for the 3rd consecutive season. The Lady Indians made their 3rd consecutive appearance in the NJCAA National Tournament. Our athletes are successful on the courts and on the fields but also in the classroom. Forty-two student-athletes were named to the FCSAA/Region 8 All-Academic Team (minimum 3.30 GPA).

Our faculty, staff and administrators work every day to ensure that our students receive the very best education and support services.

As we wrap up 2023, we have truly enjoyed celebrating the past 75 years but it's now time to look forward. We will be Future Focused in our pursuit of Changing Lives and Creating Futures!











Fall 2022 Enrollment by Academic Award





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Online learning provides greater access to higher education, especially in Chipola's five-county district. Nearly three-quarters of Chipola's students are now enrolled in at least one online course.




Chipola's Dual Enrollment Summer Academy is a Success

Chipola's second ever Dual Enrollment Summer Academy had another successful year. Students were presented with a Chipola College T-shirt on Tuesday, June 27 in honor of their hard work. Approximately forty top scholars from local high schools are enrolled and getting a head start on their college education at zero cost. The Academy was created to reduce barriers to participation and increase equitable access and success in dual enrollment.


Chipola Celebrates 75 Years of Changing Lives and Creating Futures

In celebration of Chipola's 75th Anniversary, Chipola College added four new events to the campus and invited the local community to join us as we celebrated.

On October 31, 2022, Chipola hosted its first ever community-wide Trunk or Treat event. Twenty-three decorated and candy-stocked trunks (sponsored by college departments, clubs, programs, and individuals) were spaced around Indian Circle. At 4:30 pm, Chipola welcomed children of all ages onto our campus offering a fun, safe space for them to Trunk or Treat. Before the two hour event ended, more than 4,000 members of the community walked the circle and many trunks ran out of candy by the huge demand from the little ghosts, cowboys and princesses. The feedback from the parents and grandparents as they were leaving the event was tremendous, and this was certainly the start of a new Chipola tradition!

In late November of 2022, Chipola hosted a Christmas Tree Lighting. The Chipola Facilities Department was instrumental in this event as they built a 30 foot Christmas tree made of blue Christmas Lights with a gold star on top in between the two ponds across from Chipola's Center for the Arts. On November 30, Santa Claus and the Grinch made an appearance at the Tree Lighting and many members of the community showed up to enjoy Christmas Carols and support this event. The very next night, the annual Chipola Christmas Show began, marking the start of the Christmas season for Chipola and our community.

The Chipola 5K Challenge was added to the Chipola new events line up on February 11, 2023. The 5K Challenge took place through the beautiful campus and was hosted in conjunction with Chipola's 75th Anniversary Homecoming activities. This first year event had over 100 participants despite cold, rainy weather.



Cyber Range Open House

In early 2023, Chipola College opened its brand new, state-of-the-art Cyber Range, thanks in part to a Florida Job Growth Grant awarded by Governor Ron DeSantis in August of 2021. Chipola College was awarded \$354,000 to expand cybersecurity training certification opportunities in network security and digital forensics. "Considering the threats we see from nations like China, Russia and Iran, we believe that cybersecurity will continue to be a growing part of our workforce, and I'm proud to announce these funds to equip more Floridians with the skills they need to be a part of this field," said Governor Ron DeSantis.

The project was a large undertaking as Chipola's in-house facilities team transformed two ordinary classrooms in the Business and Technology wing of Building Z into an eye-catching, high-tech space that allows for cyber range simulations and hands-on learning. Chipola's IT department sourced and installed 25 Dell Alienware Aurora Computers with High Frame Rate monitors along with 24 Computer Comforts MOBA Gaming student desks and one MOBA instructor lectern along with Cyberbit Cyberrange Simulation software.

Chipola's Business and Technology Department hosted an Open House and Ribbon Cutting for the new Cyber Range on May 16, 2023 where prospective cyber students and their parents as well as faculty, staff, administration and Chipola's Board of Directors were able to tour the range and learn more about the opportunities this new facility offers our college, our community and our state.

Chipola Ranks Well in The State and in The Nation



Chipola College celebrated its 75th Anniversary throughout the 2022-23 academic year. All year long, students, faculty, staff, alumni and even the community celebrated all of the achievements of Chipola College in its 75 years of history.

On March 30, 2023, Chipola College hosted a press conference to share and celebrate the rankings Chipola received in 2022-23. Chipola ranked well in the state of Florida and in the nation in five different online ranking polls.

Chipola President Dr. Sarah Clemmons spoke about what an honor it is to be ranked on all five of the best colleges lists in multiple categories. Dr. Clemmons gave credit to the faculty and staff saying, "I want to thank the Chipola faculty and staff for your investment in our students and academic programs because the services you provide and the one-on-one instruction help make these rankings possible. By working together, we help our students succeed and get them prepared for the future."

Dr. Pam Rentz, VP of Instructional Affairs, spoke about Chipola's high rankings on multiple lists as being one of the most affordable. Dr. Rentz said, "We understand the cost of higher education can be a financial burden, but we are dedicated to ensuring our students have the ability to pursue their dreams. Through scholarships and financial aid and affordable tuition, we are proud that we can present our students accessibility and affordability."

For 75 years, Chipola College has met student needs by offering the Associate of Arts degree, later adding the Associate of Science, Bachelor of Science, and workforce certificates. In-state tuition and fees range from \$2,335 to \$3,550 per school year for two semesters. Out of state tuition for Alabama and Georgia residents is just \$1 more per credit hour.

Set Goals, Define Purpose, Achieve Success: Chipola's Quality Enhancement Plan

Chipola College data showed the need to help students make informed decisions regarding career goals and steps to achieve those goals. Institutional data showed that students were more likely to graduate if they identified a major before beginning their second semester of enrollment. After analyzing data and reviewing feedback from constituencies and best practices of other colleges, Chipola College identified the goal of its Quality Enhancement Plan (QEP): To enable students to make informed decisions regarding their career goals and related educational pathways.

To achieve the QEP goal, faculty and staff representatives developed a two-credit hour course, SLS 1401, Career and Life Planning, that first-time-in-college, degree-seeking students take during their initial semester of enrollment. Through selfassessments and career exploratory assignments, students: (1) assess their personal skills, interests, and values related to career options; (2) research the viability of career opportunities related to the results of their self-assessments; (3) establish Achieve Success career goals and; (4) formulate personal educational plans related to their career goals.

The SLS 1401 course was piloted in the 2018 spring semester and fully implemented in the 2018 fall semester. Following each semester, college leadership analyzed course outcome data and student feedback received during focus group sessions. Based on the data and student feedback, an assessment was made of the current QEP and the SLS 1401 course, and the following changes for improvement were implemented: 1.) Reduce SLS 1401 course hours from two to one semester hour; 2.) Revisit scheduling and alignment with SLS 1101, Orientation; 3.) Eliminate certain response options from the end-ofcourse survey; 4.) Revise student learning outcome four; and 5) Advise entering degree-seeking students to enroll in SLS 1401 their first semester of enrollment.

Changing Lives and Creating Futures Institutional Highlights

- In academic year 2022-23, Chipola's Financial Aid Office administered more than \$2.6 million in federal financial aid that helped 799 students attend Chipola College.
- When asked what factors influenced them to attend Chipola College, 2022-23 entering freshmen gave the highest ratings to campus location, financial aid availability, scholarship availability, cost, and reputation of college.
- Thirty-five percent of Chipola's graduates in 2022-23 were of minority race a figure that reflects area's demographics.
- The latest data show that Chipola College enrolled 26% of students who graduated from district high schools the previous year; this compares to 25% statewide for colleges and their district high schools.



- The fall 2022 to fall 2023 retention rate of degree-seeking students who entered Chipola College with dual enrollment credits earned off campus was 74%. This compared to 60% for students who entered with no dual enrollment credits.
- There was an average deviation of five percentage points from the mean fall 2022 to fall 2023 retention rate among Chipola students when grouped by race/ethnicity.
- The fall 2022 to fall 2023 retention rate was 60% for female students and 55% for male students.
- The percentage of degree-seeking African American students entering the 2018 fall semester who graduated within 150% of normal time to completion (six semesters) was nearly double that of the 2014 fall semester entering cohort.
- During academic year 2022-23, Chipola enrolled 51 students who self-reported disabilities; the number was 39 in 2021-22.
- The latest data show that 17% of students in career and workforce development programs were enrolled in programs nontraditional for their sex.
- Eighty-nine percent of Student Support Services program participants were in good academic standing during the academic year.
- Chipola's Student Support Services program exceeded all of its target levels of performance for academic year 2022-23.
- For the fourth year in a row, Chipola's Take Stock in Children program received additional funding for achieving a luminary status, the highest among the performance rating categories.
- The Academic Center for Excellence (ACE) served 962 students during the academic year.

- On the entering student survey, respondents indicated high levels of satisfaction with academic advising.
- Respondents to the graduating student survey assigned a mean satisfaction rating of 4.28 to "quality of online courses" (5=very satisfied, 1=very dissatisfied).
- Chipola's Testing Center administered 2172 tests (e.g., online tests, CLEP, ACT, ETS Proficiency Profiles) to students during the academic year.
- The Chipola College Library gate headcount for 2022-23 was 18,866, an increase of 4,000 from the previous academic year.
- The Chipola library received a mean satisfaction rating of 4.53 from graduating students (5 = very satisfied, 1 = very dissatisfied).
- Assessment results show that students who transfer from Chipola College to State University System institutions perform as well or better than students who transfer from other Florida College System institutions.
- On the Community College Survey of Student Engagement (CCSSE), students rated their experience at Chipola College higher than did their counterparts in the national cohort in contributions to their ability to write clearly and effectively and solve numerical problems.
- When asked on the graduation student survey to indicate the extent to which their experience at Chipola helped them to acquire college-level general education competencies, the highest ratings ("much" or "very much") were given to the following competencies:
 - Comprehend and articulate effectively in English by reading, writing, and oral communication (mean of 4.33 on a 5-point scale)
 - Demonstrate basic mathematical skills and knowledge (mean of 4.32 on a 5-point scale)
 - Interpret, evaluate, and appreciate works of human culture (mean of 4.17 on a 5-point scale)
 - Evaluate societal and ethical, problems, and values (mean of 4.14 on a 5-point scale)
 - Explore the nature of science (mean of 4.05 on a 5-point scale)
- The pass rates (all attempts) on licensure exams were: paramedic 100%; RN nursing 91%, correctional officer 93%; law enforcement officer 100%; firefighter 81%; cosmetology 100%, Florida teacher certification general knowledge, professional education, subject area exams 100%
- The certification/licensure exam pass rate for all applicable programs was 91% in 2022-23.
- When asked to indicate the degree to which Chipola provides support needed to succeed in college, 82% of students responded "quite a bit" or "very much" on the Community College Survey of Student Engagement (CCSSE).

- The success rates for Chipola's program completers were: 89% in the AA degree program and 94% in AS programs. (Success = graduated, enrolled in good standing, or left in good standing)
- Two hundred thirteen students earned state-fundable industry certifications during the academic year.
- Chipola College offered students opportunities to earn industry certifications/licensures in 29 occupational programs during the academic year.
- In their annual survey, 90% of Chipola employees "agreed" or "strongly agreed" that Chipola College is a good place to work.
- Chipola's proportional expenditures of its Fund 1 operating funds for 2021-22 were: 70% for personnel, 29% for current expenses, and 1% for capital outlay.



- Chipola's occupational program offerings aligned with regional occupational demand projections, which demonstrated the college's support for economic and community development.
- In their annual survey, Chipola employees "agreed" or "strongly agreed" (mean of 4.59 on a 5-point scale) that the college's cultural events enhance the quality of life in the region.
- Eighty-eight percent of graduating students reported they were "satisfied" or "very satisfied" with the quality of teaching at Chipola College.
- Graduating student survey respondents indicated they were "satisfied" or "very satisfied" with campus safety (mean of 4.42 on a 5-point scale). The mean rating of campus safety and security on the annual employee survey was 4.45 (5 = very good, 1 = very poor).
- Graduating students reported they were "satisfied" or "very satisfied" with the quality of academic advising provided by college advisors (mean of 4.26 on a 5-point scale).
- Graduating students reported they were "satisfied" or "very satisfied" with library services provided by the college (mean of 4.53 on a 5-point scale).
- Graduating students reported they were "satisfied" or "very satisfied" with Chipola's Academic Center for Excellence (mean of 4.58 on a 5-point scale).
- Graduating students reported they were "satisfied" or "very satisfied" with their overall educational experience at Chipola College (mean of 4.53 on a 5-point scale).
- On the Community College Survey of Student Engagement (CCSSE), 95% of Chipola students indicated they would recommend the college to a friend or family member.
