Footnote 4: Must be completed with a grade of "C" or better. Accounting Majors must complete ACG 2021 & 2071 with a "B" or better.
Footnote 5: In addition to ACG 2021 and ACG 2071, students must also complete the Accounting Competency Examination with a score of 75% or higher before they can enroll in upper-level accounting courses.
Footnote 6: If student has taken 2 credits of Foreign Language in high school, then choose elective.
