Entrance Requirements

All Associate in Science degree students must complete the required English and mathematics courses with a grade of "C" or higher.



Students who have completed the State of Florida, Law Enforcement Basic Recruit Training Program (minimum of 770 clock hours) and have passed the state certification exam may petition to have clock hours converted into the following criminal justice credit hours.

- CCJ 1020 The Criminal Justice System (3 credit hours)
- CJC 1000 Law Enforcement (3 credit hours)
- CJL 2130 Criminal Evidence (3 credit hours)
- CJE 2600 Criminal Investigation (3 credit hours)
- CJB 1711 Introduction to Crime Scene Technology (3 credit hours)

Students who have completed the State of Florida, Corrections Basic Recruit Training Program (minimum of 420 clock hours) and have passed the state certification exam may petition to have clock hours converted into the following criminal justice credit hours.

- CCJ 1020 The Criminal Justice System (3 credit hours)
- CJC 1000 Introduction to Corrections

The above courses are treated like transfer credit and only apply to the Associate in Science in Criminal Justice Technology Program (the converted clock-hours will not count towards an Associate in Arts degree).
